### Argosy Editor to Visit N.C. Mutual Home Office

Henry Steeger, editor and publisher of Argosy Magazine and affiliated publications will visit the home office of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company on April 9, as the luncheon guest of A. T. Spaulding, president.

The buildings are to be named in honor and memory of the late Mrs. Lula S. Kelsey, former President of the N. C. Federation of Negro Women's Clubs, Salisbury; and Dr. John R. Larkins, Consultant, State Department of Public Welfare. The late Mrs. Kelsey was President of the Federation when the State Training School for Girls was established and began its operation. During Mrs. Kelsey's Presidency of the Federation, the officers and members of the organization supported the efforts of State officials to secure this institution. Earlier, the Federation had established and operated an institution at Eland, for delinquent girls. During the Depression it was necessary to close the facility because of financial difficulties.

Dr. Larkins worked closely with the N. C. Federation of Negro Women's Clubs, members of the Legislature, and other groups in the enactment of legislation to establish the institution and to secure appropriations to operate it.

Before coming to Durham, Steeger will deliver an address at Shaw University. Steeger received his education at Princeton University in New Jersey, and the University of Berlin. He is a former president of the National Urban League; a vice president, Madison Square Boys' Club; Lt. Commander, U. S. Coast Guard (World War II); member, Departmental Advisory Council of the Department of Sociology and Anthropology, Princeton University; trustee, Society for the Rehabilitation of the Facially Disabled, Inc.; member, National Advisory Council of Reading Reform Foundation; co-founder, Court of Last Resort; and a member of the Commandant's Advisory Panel, U. S. Coast Guard.
