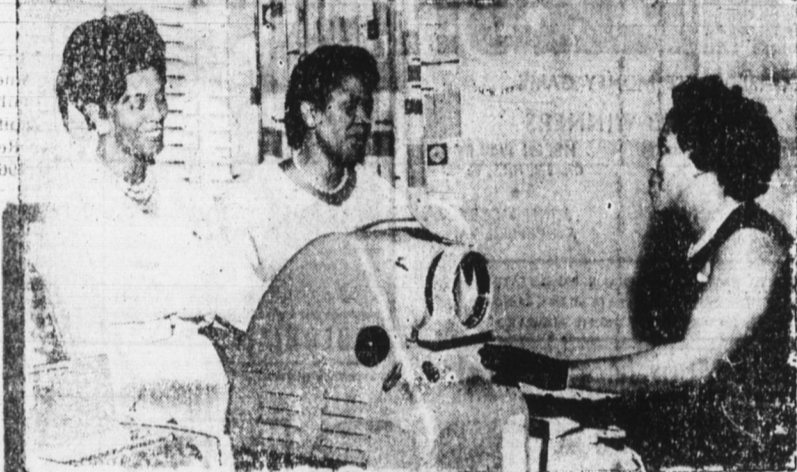


Sorority Denounces Firing of Teachers

Is the nation in for another "long hot summer," the mayoral bid of State Rep. Carl B. Stokes of Cuyahoga County, a Negro Democrat. The frustration of many people is being channeled into organizing his campaign for the November election, Cooper says.

High unemployment in this Federally-designated "depressed area" could trigger disorders, though, Cooper says Negroes make up 16 percent of the labor force but 35 percent of the jobless. He's secured two Federal grants totaling over \$500,000 for retraining 1,600 men but says, "This is a drop in the bucket. We've got to have pick-and-shovel jobs for the 'hard core' unemployed."

In Akron, Director Vernon L. Odom says, "People here are mistaking some progress in jobs for fundamental change. Well it isn't."

Both Odom and Warren's Director W. R. Smalls are concerned over police attitudes. "We've got to have some improvement in the police force," the former says.

"Our hope is tempered by skepticism," said James Ethridge, the League's housing director in Columbus. "We're still not sure of the white man's commitments."

Although he praised a new committee made up of businessmen for opening jobs at all levels, and city officials for hiring Negro youths in summer posts, he said, "There's been no improvement whatever in housing. And that's a sore spot."

In Dayton, says director Charles W. Washington, "Things are so damn quiet it worries me" He said Negroes are taking hope from the involvement of church groups but are upset over the lack of a State fair housing law.

"We want good homes," he said, "just like everybody else."

Says Cleveland's director Ernest C. Cooper, "The mood here is one of watchful waiting. We've got a breathing spell. The city's bought a little time."

The lake city's 280,000 Negroes don't "expect miracles," he reports, but they do insist on sincere action by whites.

Evidence of this has been the opening by major firms of a Job Center where Negro College graduates are being interviewed, and increased discussions between the "power structure" and the rights leaders.

Drive Launched to Encourage Girls to Enter Nursing

NEW YORK—High school girls in all parts of the nation have already responded to the recently launched press and radio campaign to recruit student nurses.

Aimed largely at attracting more Negroes to the nursing profession, the campaign is expected to help relieve the critical nurse shortage in the nation's hospitals. At present, one out of every five

nursing positions in the country's 7,100 hospitals is unfilled, the American Nurses Association reported recently.

The latest statistics also show that less than five per cent of all professional nurses are Negroes, though Negroes constitute 11 per cent of the United States population.

The campaign had its origin

early this year in the free distribution of a pamphlet "How You Can Become a Nurse," produced with the cooperation of Harlem Hospital in New York. The booklet dramatizes in a picture story the steps leading to a career as a registered nurse, including admission requirements of nursing schools. It also points up the availability of Government loans for tuition fees.

Distribution of the pamphlet was followed by published and broadcast appeals for student nurses in newspapers serving the nation's Negro communities and fifty-eight Negro-oriented radio stations, serving twenty states in the East, Midwest, South and Southwest.

The public-service announcements urge high-school girls to send for the booklet. In many cases, taped announcements are broadcast by registered nurses.

To follow through on the radio appeals, a career workshop has been scheduled at Harlem Hospital to which girls in the New York area who have requested the pamphlet are invited. A panel of physicians, nurses and recruitment officials will answer questions about the nursing profession. A transcript of the session will be supplied to press and radio outlets.

In addition to the individual requests for the pamphlet, distribution was made to such centers as the Government-operated Freedmen's Hospital School of Nursing in Washington, D. C., high schools and leading nursing schools.
