

**DISCHARGED VETS NOW ELIGIBLE FOR OUTPATIENT MED TREATMENT**

WINSTON-SALEM — J. D. DeRamus, manager of the N. C. Veterans Administration Regional Office, this week urged non-service-connected veterans, survivors and dependents who received income questionnaires with their November checks, to fill them out in detail and return them as soon as possible.

Pensioners, DeRamus said, have until January 31, 1966, to return their income questionnaires, but he urged them to take care of the matter as soon as their total 1965 income can be determined.

Pensioners also must indicate on the questionnaires the amount of income they expect to receive during the calendar year 1966.

Persons receiving pensions are required by law to provide this information to the Veterans Administration before the January 31, 1966, deadline.

Income questionnaires were mailed in envelopes with November checks, normally received about December 1. They went to all veterans receiving non-service-connected pension, to widows receiving death pension, and to dependent parents receiving dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC).

**ICBO Honors H. McClellan; Begins Drive**

NEW YORK — Cornerstone contributions intended as the foundation for a million dollars' worth of credit available to operators of small businesses in the Watts district of Los Angeles were presented to the Coordinating Committee of the Interracial Council for Business Opportunity in Los Angeles last week.

The first contribution came in the form of a \$10,000 check presented by Charles T. Williams, vice president of Schenley Distillers Company, to Norman O. Houston and Victor Carter, co-chairmen of the Los Angeles ICBO, during a luncheon at the Los Angeles Biltmore Hotel.

The luncheon honored H. C. (Chad) McClellan chairman of the August riots. The ICBO had the Commerce Rehabilitation Committee which had begun to investigate the rebuilding of Watts immediately following the August riots. The ICBO had established a business assistance center in Watts five days after the riots had ended, and McClellan's committee worked with the ICBO in determining ways in which the area could be rebuilt and rehabilitated.

Rodman C. Rockefeller, vice president of Basic Economy Corp., New York, and national co-chairman of the ICBO, told of the strides made by the national organization and of plans for expansion into other cities. He said it is hoped that Detroit, Cleveland, Chicago, Washington, D. C., and Newark all will have ICBO chapters within the next few years.

**EIGHT WOMEN BEGIN TRAINING IN BREAKTHROUGH'S TARGET AREA A**

Five home management aides and three health aides began training Monday in Operation Breakthrough's "Target Area A" headquarters on Pettigrew St. These eight women, all residents of the area, will help to implement home management and health services of the anti-poverty organization.

Mrs. Clara Lawson, home management coordinator for Target Area A, will conduct a four-week's training for the following prospective home management aides: Mrs. Shirley Watson, 806 Mobile St.; Mrs. Carrie McNeil, 420 Henry St.; Mrs. Azerine Johnson, 714 Fargo St.; Mrs. Irene Joyner, 1-A Lawson St., McDougald Terrace; and Mrs. Rubye Gaddis, 511 South St.

An eight-week training period will be held by Mrs. Carolyn Kiesau, public health nurse for Target Area A, for the following health aide trainees: Mrs. Mary Louise Rand, 313 Baxter St.; Mrs. Annie P. Williams, 118 Bond St.; and Mrs. Mildred Mildred Royal, 609 Chess Place.

Emphasis in the home management course will be placed on foods and nutrition, clothing for the family and articles for the home, child care and personal care, family relations, and housekeeping and home management. Aides in this program will serve as recruiters for classes in these areas of study. In the beginning, they will set up classes and keep records of attendance. As they gain experience, they will eventually assist Mrs. Lawson in the class instruction.

Trainees in health will receive instruction in hygiene of the individual and family maternal and child health, adult health problems, communicable diseases, chronic diseases, community health, and mental health.

Upon completion of their training, the health aides will maintain relations between

residents of Target Area A and local community health and welfare agencies. They will aid families in securing needed health care, and they will provide instruction for children in good health habits.

Trainees in both programs will receive salaries during their period of instruction.
