Rams Hand Eagles First Loss of Cage Season

WINSTON-SALEM — The Winston-Salem State College Rams, sparked by Earl Monroe, toppled the North Carolina College Eagles from the ranks of the undefeated last week with a 109-91 victory.

This defeat ended a five-game winning string for NCC, all in the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Winston-Salem State is now 3-0 in the CIAA and 5-1 for the season. The game marked

the end of pre-holiday play for both teams. Monroe hit 15 of 24 shots from the floor, shooting from various angles, and made 8 of 11 free throws for 38 points. He was high point man for the night.

Also in double figures for the Rams were Joe Cunningham with 17 (plus 10 rebounds) Eugene Smiley, 12, and Howard (Sonny) Ridgill, 14.

Ted Manning led NCC with 30 points, making 14 of 29 shots from the floor, most of them long jumpers, and two of four free throws. Freshman Lee Davis, 6-7 scored 20 points and led the team with nine rebounds. Joseph Pridden scored 12, and Albert Connor sank 10.

The Rams got off to a slow start. The Eagles had taken a 11-3 lead before the Rams caught fire after the game had been under way eight minutes. Monroe started the rally with an outside jump shot and Reid tied the score at 13-13 at the 11:50 mark.

By halftime Winston-Salem State led 57-36. The closest NCC got to the Rams early in the second half was 16 points. Coach C. E. (Bighouse) Gaines took out all of his regulars except Monroe with three minutes remaining after the Rams had moved ahead 102-83. NCC scored eight straight points, cutting the lead to 108-91 as the final whistle sounded.

The Rams shot 57.5 per cent in the first half (23 of 40) while the Eagles hit for only 41.2 per cent (14-34). The Eagles did better in the second half, making 56.1 per cent (23 of 41) while the Rams hit 53.8 per cent (21 of 39).

Mays To Be Honored

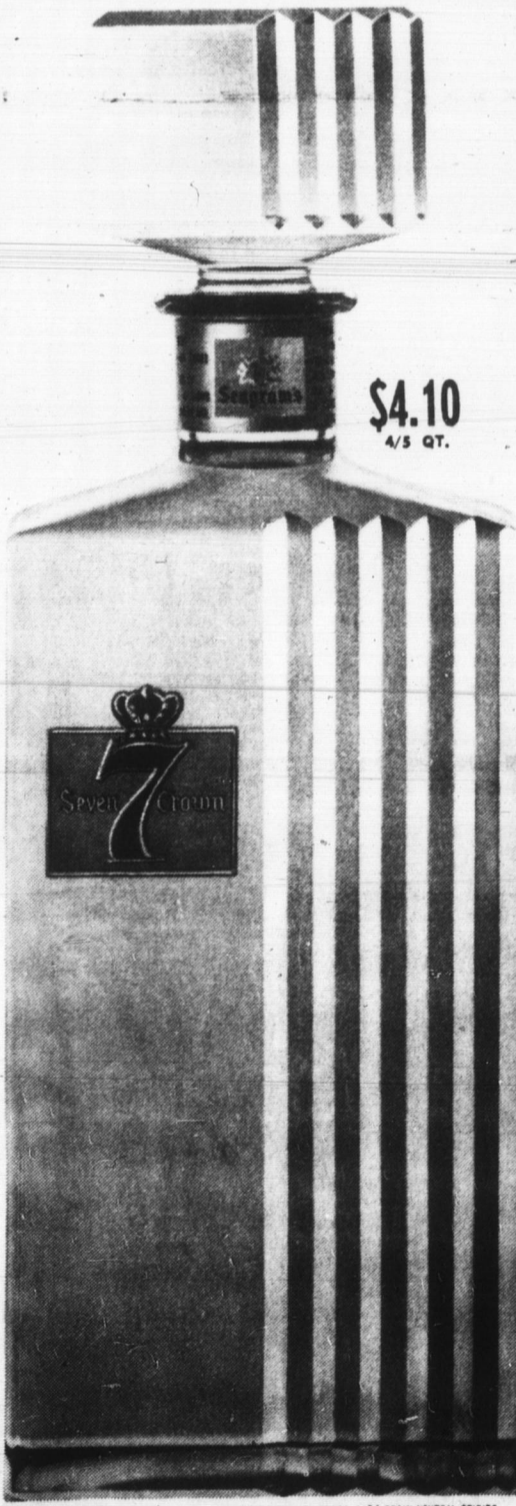

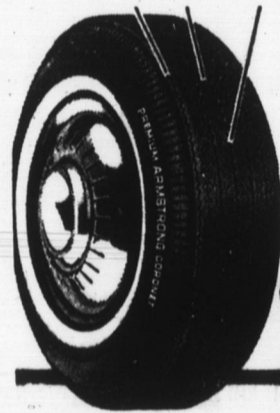
