anthropology at Harvard U. Weatherford's professional career began in 1934 when he became principal of Bladenboro (NC) Junior High School and Supervisor of County Rec-

From 1936 to 1939 he wa director of Health, Physical Education and Recreation at Bishoy College, Marshal, Tex. He served in a similar capa-city at St. Augustine's College, Raleigh (NC) during 1937-1945.

After serving as Supervisor Municipal Recreation Negroes in Raleigh from 1946-1947, Weatherford became a graduate assistant with teaching and research responsibilities in the College of Physical Education at Penn State.

He joined the NCC staff in 1948 and was appointed acting chairman of the Department of Phyiscal Education and Recre-ation in 1951. He served as permanent since 1962.

Weatherford was married to the former Miss Rebecca Christmas of Durham, Mrs. Weatherford and the couple's 6 children survive at their Raleigh residence. Four sons and two daughters born to the family, are: Allen Ericson Weatherford, III, 23; Thomas Garfield III, 15; Peter Michael Karpo-vitch, 11; Sequoyah Rhinehardt, 7; Cornelia Tonseler, 21 and Rebecca Christmas, II, 9.


He was ordained to the priesthood in 1959, and has served in parishes in Char lotte, Southern Pines, and Sanford, before coming to Dur ham.


