BAPTISTS ADOPT SHAREHOLDERS PLAN FOR SHAW UNIVERSITY

RALEIGH — The General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina through its General Board in special session last week adopted the "Shareholders Plan" for Shaw University.

Dr. J. Ray Butler, Wilmington, Chairman of the General Board, in making the announcement stated that the Shareholders Plan is the kind of program which can develop a unified body of church support whose interest in Christian Higher education can be kept alive by a direct relationship to the school. The Shareholders Plan, primarily a program for fund raising, will serve a number of vital functions in addition to securing money for the operation of

the school. Some of these functions are: (1) to stimulate and maintain within the churches of the Convention the awareness of the church's responsibility for the support of Christian Higher Education, (2) to provide the Institution with a body of reliable constituent, and (3) to provide for the churches an educational Center to serve as the main focal point of the intellectual life of the church, from which the churches can draw leadership both in the laity and the clergy.

Chairman Butler states that the Shareholders Plan will be promoted among the churches of the Convention as a part of the Convention's Unified Program.

Says New Youth Becoming Less Woman-Led

ATLANTA, Ga. — A recent survey conducted by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference found that the present generation of Southern Negroes, especially those involved in bringing about social change, is less of a matriarchal society than the one before it.

This finding was reached by SCLC's Citizenship Education Department following a workshop held at the Penn Community Center, Frogmore, S. C.

Dr. Robert L. Green, Educational Psychologist on leave from Michigan State University who heads the Citizenship Education Department, said that the survey conclusion was based largely upon responses from workshop participants in a questionnaire designed to measure certain social attitudes, and to gather demographic data.

He wrapped up the survey with the statement "To the extent that the personnel examined here are representative of leaders of the Southern Negro community, it would seem that the most recent generation is less of a matriarchal society than the one before it; at least in the case of those bringing about social change."

WSS College to Dedicate 2 Buildings In Jan.

WINSTON-SALEM — A former employee of Winston-Salem State College and a financier will be honored January 23, when a campus building bearing the name of each

of these persons is dedicated. Dr. H. Kenneth Barker, Associate Executive Secretary of the Association of Colleges for Teacher Education will be the principal speaker at the ceremonies to be held in Fries Auditorium at 3 p.m.

The occasion will be a formal affair with caps and gowns. The college faculty and staff and the seniors will participate. Music will be furnished by the college choir and an instrumental ensemble.

A dormitory for senior women—the C. Beatrice Moore Hall—will be dedicated in honor of Miss C. Beatrice Moore. Miss Moore retired from the college at the end of the 1962-63 academic year after serving for over 30 years as college dietitian.

A two-time graduate of the college, she completed the teacher training program when

the school was called Slater State Normal School and she finished the home economics program after the college became Winston-Salem Teachers College.

A science building will also be dedicated. It was completed during the past summer and put into service this fall. It is named the J. S. Hill Hall in honor of the late J. S. Hill. Hill was a staunch friend of the college who spent considerable time raising money to support the school during its early history.
