FSC Awarded \$83,830 by U.S. Office of Education for Institute

830 by the United States Office Summer Institute for Advanced Study in English for Elementary teachers, it was announced by President Rudolph Jones.

Supported under the National Defense Education Act, Title XI, the Institute will offer courses in Grammar and Composition, Children's Literature and the Teaching of Reading for a period of seven weeks from June 13 to July 29. Optional credit of six semester hours will be given to those participants who request it upon successful completion of the courses of instruction.

The Institute will be limited sixty participants selected by a screening committee. Participants will be drawn largely from North and South Carolina and Virginia, though a small number of participants from other areas may be accepted. Each participant will receive a stipend of \$75 per week for the period of attendance, and each individual with one or
