Seeks Appeals In Searches Court Ruling

RICHMOND — Two civil rights organizations last week asked the Fourth U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals here to overturn a lower court's refusal to enjoin Baltimore police from searching private buildings without first obtaining search warrants.

NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund lawyers along with attorneys for the Baltimore NAACP branch brought the appeal in behalf of seven Baltimore Negroes. The suit is a class action in behalf of all Negroes similarly situated. It stems from an intensive police manhunt a year ago for two Negro brothers suspected of the Christmas Eve holdup of a liquor store and the subsequent shooting of two white policemen.

In the 19 days following the crimes special police squads, in many cases acting on anonymous "tips," conducted more than 300 searches of Negro homes, churches and businesses for the brothers, Samuel and Earl Veney.

OVER 20 FAMILIES EVICTED IN ALA. FOR TRYING TO USE VOTING RIGHT

ATLANTA, Ga. — Stokely Carmichael, Lowndes County NAACP workers, said that over twenty families have been evicted because they were active in the Lowndes County, Alabama voter registration campaign.

The evicted people will be living in "tent city" in tents put up on seven acres of land that the Lowndes County

Christian Movement has purchased from friends of the Movement. "The people were told to get off the land by January 1," says Carmichael, "but they're not going to get off because they know there are no jobs in the big cities. They know if they leave, the strength of the voter registration campaign would diminish."

Tent City is being built seven miles from where Mrs. Viola Luizzo was killed and twenty miles from where John Daniels was killed. SNCC workers, Stokely Carmichael, Gloria Larry, Scotty B. Smith and Fay Belamy will stay in the tents with the evicted farmers. Tents are being used because some families are too large to move in with relatives or friends. The tents will provide more space.
