Funeral services for Johnny Roy Mears, 65, who died January 2 at Duke Hospital were held Saturday, January 8 at the Mount Vernon Baptist Church. Burial was in the Glennview Memorial Park.

A retired employee of the American Tobacco Company, Mears, the son of the late John Mears and Malinda McNeil Mears, was born March 10, 1900 in Bladen County. He received his education in the Scotland County Schools.

A member of the Mount Vernon Baptist Church since 1938 when he moved his membership from Solid Rock Baptist Church in Laurinburg, Mears was a member of the Tonkins Bible Class and served as treasurer for 23 years. He married Miss Ruth Allen in 1942.

He received a trophy for "Man of the Year" in 1963. In 1959 he received a twenty-five year membership Certificate.

He was a member of the Doric Lodge Number 28. He was very active in the Masonic Affairs. He was also a member of the NAACP, a member of the Royal Arches and a member of the Durham Committee on Negro Affairs.
