TEACHERS CONFAB TOLD BUCK-PASSING TIME HAS RUN OUT

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Where desegregation of school faculties is concerned, "we don't have time to be Negro or Caucasian—we only have time to be good teachers."

Furthermore the time for buck-passing on this issue has run out.

These statements by Assistant Superintendent Howard E. Row of the Delaware State Department of Public Instruction at Dover, and Classroom Teacher Thelma Davis of Griffin, Ga., underlined the urgency of the two-day Regional Conference on Faculty Desegregation held here this week for some 200 educators from five states and the District of Columbia.

Sponsored by the National Education Association in cooperation with two of its affiliates, the District of Columbia Education Association (DCEA) and the Arlington Edu-

cation Association (AEA), the Washington meeting was second in a series of four regional NEA conferences supported by funds from the U.S. Office of Education. Coordinator of the conferences is the NEA Subcommittee on Human Rights of Educators. Mrs. Harriet F. DeMond, president of DCEA and Robert W. Bogen, executive secretary of AEA, co-chaired the Washington sessions.

Like a previous meeting in Fort Worth, Tex., and two others to be held in Atlanta, Ga. and Nashville, Tenn., the NEA conference here brought teachers and administrators together to consider impact of the USOE guidelines on faculty desegregation. The intent of those guidelines, William Holloway of USOE told participants, is "total elimination of the dual school system in this country."

PACKSACK LIVING AND JUNGLES TALES SCOUT THEME FOR MAY

"Packsack Living and Jungles Tales" are the themes for May.

Boy Scouts will practice outdoor skills and learn more about packsack living in the Cheyenne Leaf District in May according to Lewis N. Owens, District Commissioner.

Packing Light, a backpacking campout, will test the Scouts ability to carry all needed food and equipment to a special camping spot. Scouts will use dehydrated and dried foods that take up little space and require no refrigeration, Owens said.

At troop and patrol meetings, there will be instructions on use of hike clothing and equipment, types of packs and how to pack them, preparation of individual and patrol equipment, menu planning using dehydrated food, campsite selection, proper methods of tent pitching and camp sanitation procedures.

More than 600 Cub Scouts in the Cheyenne Leaf District (Durham) will follow the theme "Jungle Tales in May." In addition to the use of Kipling's

"The Jungle Book," the Cub Scouts will make Jungles costumes and stage properties with the help of their parents, learn jungle dances and prepare to perform at the monthly pack meeting.

High school age Explorers will select in May from such program activities as American Heritage service projects, Appraisal Night, and a training session for the "Ready" emergency preparedness program.

The training session will cover family preparedness and emergency living including home fire prevention, home fire-escape plan, home fire fighting, first-aid in the home, emergency food supply, and where to go and what to take in case of emergency evacuation.

Many of the Boy Scout will be attending Camp Reeves in Moore County April 29-30 and May 1. Explorer Scouts will join in with them in helping on their awards. Cub Scouts

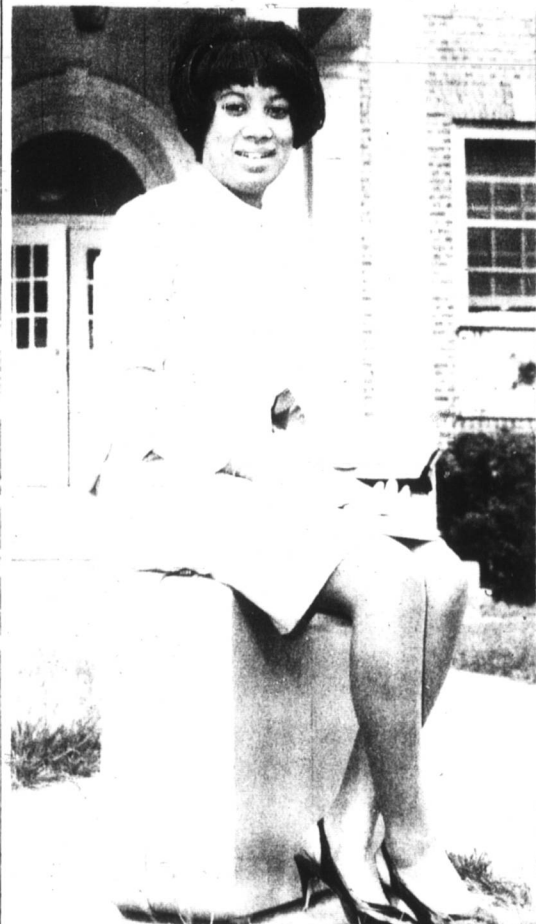

Summer Classes in Astronomy To be Held at Planetarium

CHAPEL HILL — The Morehead Planetarium has just completed planning the 1966 Summer Science Series. Information on these classes in astronomy is now available from the Planetarium to all parents in the area who may be interested in enrolling their children.

There will be two age levels. Children between ages 8 and 11 may take "Astronomy of the Solar System" at 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. Monday through Friday mornings June 13 through 24. Also, for this age group the Planetarium is offering "Astronomy Beyond the Planets" at 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. June 27 thru July 9 (No class July 4, extra class July 9). These same courses are offered for young people age 12 through 16 from 1 to 2 p.m.

"Astronomy of the Solar System" will give 10 class meetings of discussion to the sun, moon, planets, comets, asteroids and meteoroids. "Astronomy Beyond the Planets" will devote the same amount of time to the constellations, stars, galaxies, nebulae and the structure and nature of the universe. All classes will meet in the Planetarium chamber and employ the Zeiss Planetarium projector.
