New Book on -R Killings

NEW YORK-It was not un til the killing of James Reeb the minister from Boston, that the white public began to be concerened about civil rights murders.

For example, the death of Jimmy Lee Jackson. Alabama logger shot by a state trooper, created no more than a ripple in the national consciousnessthere was not wave of protest when the Rey George W Lee was killed in Belzoni, Mississippi—the slaying of Medgar Evers and the Birmingham children reached and touched the country's conscience only momentarily

So says Reverend Jack Men delsohn, pastor of the Arling ton Street Unitarian Church in Boston, in a book titled "The Martyrs-16 Who Gave Their Lives for Racial Justice.

The sixteen "martyrs" view ed here include George W. Lee Negro Baptist minister; Wil iam Moore, white postman killed while delivering a letter of protest to Governor Wallace Viola Liuzzo, Detroit house wife - mother killed in Selma, Ala.: Andrew Goodman, Michael Schwerner, James Chaney, three CORE members kidnapped and murdered in Mississippi; James Reeb, white "family man," whose death was the first to cause a major impact.

The author visited the families of these sixteen, obtaindirector and associate director ing access to correspondence, private diaries and unpublished interviews. In some cases, he recorded eye-witness accounts of the actual circumstances of Prescription for Change," the murders.

"Until now, some of the rafor the fifth reporting period, James Alonzo Stewart, Creasie have gone virtually unreported," he states. 


