Employment Shows Slow Steady Rise

WASHIINGTON, D. C .- The Negro employment - unemployment picture shows slow but steady improvement with the seasonal fluctuations affecting the general labor force.

Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics notes that at the end of March 1966. the nonwhite employed labor force numbered 8.535,000, an increase of 202,000 from a year ago in March 1965, and an increase of 16.000 over February's (1966) 8.519.000.

Unemployment among nonwhites totaled over 600,000 in March 1966, accounting for about one-fifth of total unemployment. Nevertheless, their jobless rate, at 7.2 percent, was down 1.4 percentage points from a year ago in March 1965. And, in April 1966, unemploy ment among nonwhite workers decreased to 550,000 with jobless rate of 7.0 percent.

Stubbornly, this unemployment rate (7.0 percent) continues to represent about twice the rate for white workers.
