Employment Shows Slow Steady Rise

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Negro employment - unemployment picture shows slow but steady improvement with the seasonal fluctuations affecting the general labor force.

Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics notes that at the end of March 1966, the nonwhite employed labor force numbered 8,535,000, an increase of 202,000 from a year ago in March 1965, and an increase of 16,000 over February's (1966) 8,519,000.

Unemployment among nonwhites totaled over 600,000 in March 1966, accounting for about one-fifth of total unemployment. Nevertheless, their jobless rate, at 7.2 percent, was down 1.4 percentage points from a year ago in March 1965. And, in April 1966, unemployment among nonwhite workers decreased to 550,000 with a jobless rate of 7.0 percent.

Stubbornly, this unemployment rate (7.0 percent) continues to represent about twice the rate for white workers.

THREE LEADING COACHES SLATED FOR A. AND T. COACHING CLINIC

GREENSBORO — Three big names in football and basketball coaching circles will highlight the annual Coaching Clinic to be held at A. and T. College, August 4-6.

Heading up the football section is Lou Saban, former head coach with the Buffalo Bills and for basketball, Dave Strack, head basketball coach at the University of Michigan and Johnnie McLendon, head basketball coach at Kentucky State College, will share lead roles.

Saban, now head football coach at the University of Maryland, as head man at Buffalo for four years, won American Football League championships, and was named "Coach of the Year" in 1964 and 1965. A star player at Indiana University, Saban for four years played for and captained the Cleveland Browns. Besides a one-year stint as head coach for the Boston Patriots, he previously held head coach positions at several colleges and universities in the mid-west.

Strack, considered one of the top basketball strategists in the nation, is best known for the job performed at the University of Michigan, his alma mater. In five years from 1960 to 1965, he brought the Wolverines from the bottom of the cellar in the "Big Ten," to the top. In 1965 he was named "Coach of the Year."

M. J. MARVIN SERVES AS A. M. A. WORKSHOP DISCUSSION LEADER

Murray J. Marvin, North Carolina Mutual's Planning Director, served as a discussion leader at an American Management Association sponsored three day Workshop-seminar on the Organization and Management of the Building Services Function, May 16 through 18, at the Hotel La Salle in Chicago, Illinois.

The A. M. A. annually sponsors several hundred "Workshop Seminars" each year in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles wherein a small group of seasoned executives meet for the sole purpose of exchanging operating experience in a particular management field or on a particular management problem for a three day period. Registration for the Workshop costs \$175.

Marvin says his selection to serve as a discussion leader for this group of 18 men reflects a trend in progressive management to separate organized planning from doing and the insistence that planned work, measured against recognized norms, costs far less than unplanned work conducted on a non-standard, trial-and-error basis.

Emphasis at this particular Workshop Seminar will be on the opportunities and economies of the more effective use of human resources in our age of technological change. "Our office," he said, "has done considerable work and study in the area of organizational streamlining with tighter, decentralized controls as a means of affording job enlargement and

increased job satisfaction." "It is really a question of the old Indians-and-chiefs ratio. Better equipped and better trained Indians require fewer chiefs. Thus, by simply squeezing the fat out of supervision costs, it is possible to pay operative personnel better salaries without necessarily adding to total cost."
