433 to Graduate at Morgan State June 6

BALTIMORE, Md.—Morgan State College will award its first master's degrees and confer honorary degrees on five persons at the commencement exercises for the 99th session, 6 p.m., Monday, June 6, in Hughes Stadium. There are 433 graduates from 17 states, the District of Columbia and 8 foreign countries and U.S. possessions.

Dr. James Nabrit, Deputy Representative of the USA to the United Nations, who is on leave as president of Howard University, will be the main speaker and receive the degree of Doctor of Humanities. Other recipients of honorary degrees are:

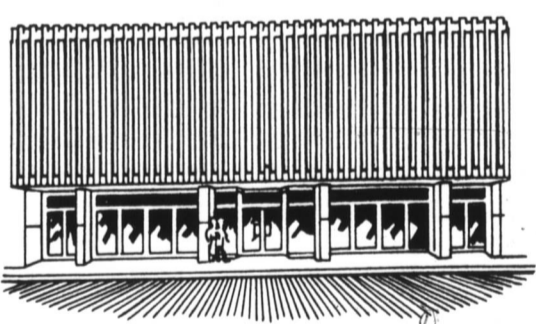
