These included land purchases totaling \$200.000; an addition to the home economics building, \$122,000 installation of a clock system, \$18,000; an addition to the current storage building, \$35,000; an addition to the maintenance shop, \$43

000; and campus planning, \$25, 000. New construction projects recommended were a communications building, \$1,269.000; a president's home, \$72,000; a healt science building, \$750,000;

The parcel of land, consist ing of over six acres, is located on Fayetteville Street in the southern part of the city, ad-joining the Beechwood Cemetery area. Purchase of the property was made from the Vickers family, August 23.

Relocation of the church has been made necessary because of the proposed East-West expressway project of the Urban Redevelopment Program now under development in the city. White Rock is one of the oldest churches of the city, having occupied its present location since 1890 when the first unit of the present structure was erected. The entire membership at the time was 300. It now has a membership of around 1200
