For the Brunch Bunch by Betty Crocker

Something easy — something different — something as delicious as it is good to look at. For example. Melt butter in large skillet. Add onion tops and cook until tender. Beat eggs thoroughly; blend in dried beef and cottage cheese. Add egg mixture to onion and cook like scrambled eggs for servings. (Try this one eggs. 6 servings. (Try this one for supper, too. With, say, hot corn bread, salad greens and

fresh fruit for dessert.)

While guests gather, how about tomato juice with slices of lime or lemon? Small serv ings passed on a tray by host or hostess.
