The contestants held their initial meeting at Durham Business College auditorium on Sunday, February 19, at which time they received information and instructions for their participation.

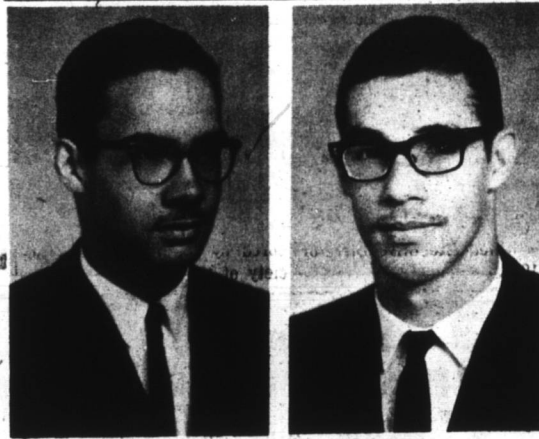
