Taxpayers ask IRS?

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q -- A neighbor of mine had some hard luck last year and I paid a few of his bills. Can I deduct this on my return?

A -- Although your actions were humanitarian, the law does not consider gifts to individuals as tax-deductible contributions.

Q -- If I file a separate return can I claim my wife as a dependent? She doesn't earn enough to support herself.

A -- No. The law does not permit one spouse to claim the other as a dependent. You may claim an exemption for your wife if she had no gross income and was not the dependent of another taxpayer.

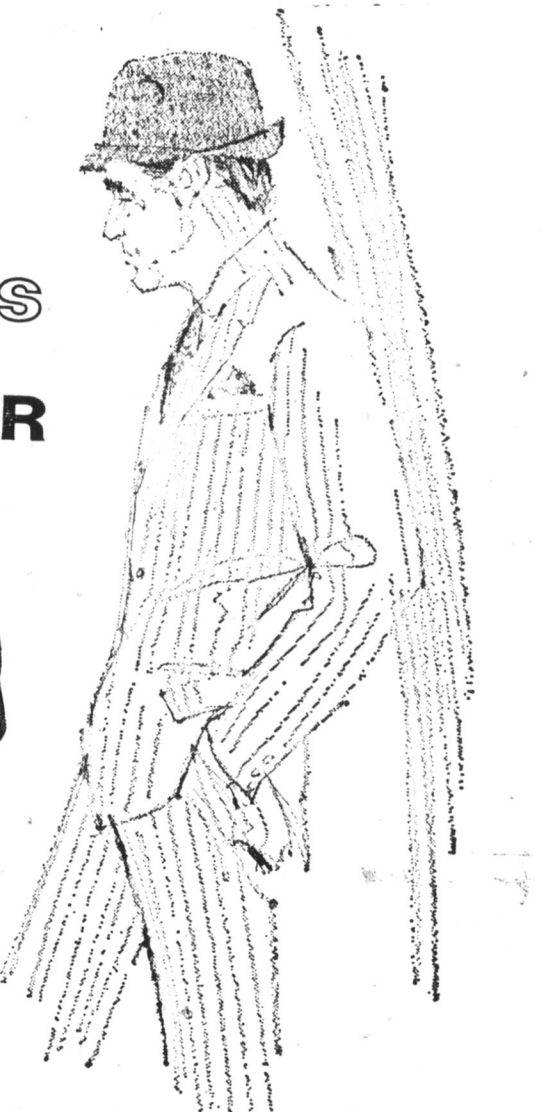
