## Va. Seminary To Install New President Sat.

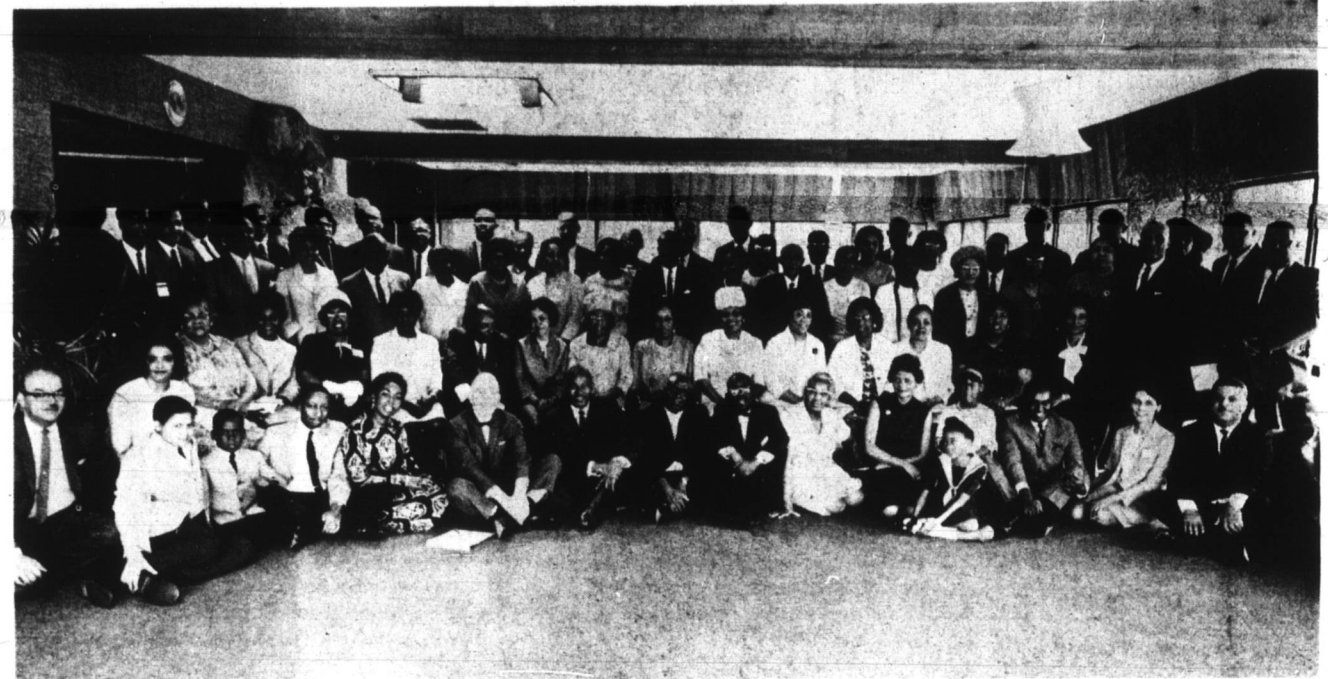
