 Joe Campbell tells us that his missus nearly drove him to strong spirits by all the time rearranging the furniture so that it wouldn't look so cluttered. Seems like they had accumulated so much stuff during their thirty years of marriage that there was furniture tucked in every nook and cranny of the house, not to mention the garage and basement and attic.
Joe's Bright Idea
 Happily, Joe hit upon a solution. He called up Tom Perry, the remodeling contractor, and had a great big family room attached to the rear of the house. His missus entered right into the spirit of things. She recovered an old couch in the basement and put it in the new room. That antique rocker she got 3 years ago, looked just right by the fireplace. Always had cluttered up the living room even if it was a family heirloom.
 Sawing down the legs of a table he found in the attic. Joe made a handsome coffee table. And some lamps that had been gathering dust in a closet came in mighty handy. There's even a desk in the new room, one that Joe used to keep paints, nails and tools in. About the only thing they had to buy was an inexpensive rug.

Carve Like a Master Chef
 Newly developed cordless electric carving knives make carving and slicing of meat, poultry and other foods easier and fun - no longer a job only for experts. Professional results can be had by following a few simple rules.
 Chef Mario Tanzi of the Antlers Restaurant on New York's Wall Street, tells and shows how to carve two of the most common meats - roast turkey and ribs of beef.
ROAST TURKEY
 To carve a roast turkey, Chef Tanzi says, first grasp the leg and pull it away gently while cutting through the meat and joint between thigh and body. Cut the thigh from the drumstick at the joint.
 Carve meat from drumstick and thigh parallel to the bone and set it aside. With fork astride breastbone, cut the wing from the body.
 To carve breast, start just above where the wing was removed. Cut thin slices parallel to the breastbone, then turn the bird and repeat the procedure.
 It must be remembered that an electric knife is different from an ordinary carving knife. The lightweight cordless model used by Chef Tanzi, made by Rival Manufacturing Company of Kansas City, Mo., requires no sawing back and forth. A slight downward pressure to guide the blade is all that is needed.
RIB ROAST OF BEEF
 To carve a rib roast of beef, place the roast with larger cut surface down and rib side to your left. Insert carving fork between two top ribs. Starting at the right outside edge, carve across the face of the roast toward the rib side with slices about a quarter-inch thick.
 To release the slices, cut along rib bone with the end of the knife. For easier carving, ask your butcher to cut the backbone from the ribs when you buy the roast.
 Best results are obtained if you let hot roasts stand 15 to 20 minutes before carving. This allows juices to set and makes carving easier and neater. It also keeps juices in the meat.

Carbon Monoxide: Canny Murderer
 Carbon monoxide takes more than 1,000 American lives each year, most of them in automobiles.
 Recognizing symptoms of CO poisoning, the Catholic Digest advises, might save your life. Remember that though exhaust fumes and smoke can be seen and smelled, the carbon monoxide in the exhaust cannot. Engines of new cars produce as much carbon monoxide as old engines, but older cars are more likely to have leaks in the exhaust system. In any car, a leak can start at any time without warning. A muffler can be leaking without being noisy.
