Six Southern States Integration Fight School

Court Orders **Top to Bottom** Integration

WASHINGTON - Respond-Court's action this week-allowing accelerated southern integration - the NA-ACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, Inc. announced a step-up of litigation in nearly 200 cases.

The ruling, in effect, calls for top to botton school integration in six deep southern states.

The high court refused to review the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling affecting nine crucial school integration cases.

Under the Appeals Court decision in the Caddo Parish group of cases, "a desegregation plan must work, must abolish the dual school system the identifiable Negro school," said LDF Director Counsel Jack Greenberg.

This is "the most influential desegregation opinion since the Supreme Court's 1954 school ruling," Mr. Green-
