Central Carolina Farmers Holds Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting

1,100 Stockholders of Central Carolina Farmers paid tribute to the past and looked toward the future at their 37th Annual Meeting Thursday morning, October 19, at the Durham National Guard Armory.

C. W. Tilson, who retired as CCF General Manager October 1, was honored for his 37 years service to the cooperative. The Board of Directors, on behalf of CCF's 8,000 farmer-members, presented a color television set to Mr. Tilson in appreciation of his tireless efforts and devotion. A Resolution was entered by CCF President H. S. Hogan, Route 2, Chapel Hill. It stated that the stockholders "here make a formal expression of our great appreciation to C. W. Tilson for the great portion of his life that he devoted without hesitation to the success, growth and management of this cooperative."

Under Tilson's leadership the farm cooperative has grown from its beginning in 1930 with \$2,400 capital and 400 members to over \$4,250,000 net worth and over \$30 million annual business serving its farmer-owners and patrons in central North Carolina.

The stockholders also welcomed new General Manager G. Brantley DeLoatche. He has progressed through Central Carolina Farmers over a period of 19 years. Since 1951 he has been Assistant General Manager since 1963. Under his management CCF outgrew its old feed mill and in 1965 built a fully automated and most efficient feed manufacturing plant. It manufactures more than 500 tons per day for poultry, dairy and livestock farmers, and this is one of the most efficient in the nation.

Mail Overseas Packages By November 11

Christmas parcels to members of the Armed Forces overseas, if sent by surface transportation, should be mailed no later than November 11 to arrive by Christmas.

The term "Armed Forces Overseas" includes personnel of the Armed Forces, members of their families, and U.S. civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO or FPO, New York, San Francisco or Seattle.

Gift parcels, weighing not more than 5 pounds and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, addressed to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam will be provided air-lift service on a space available basis from the west coast even though prepaid at the surface rate. These parcels should be endorsed with the large letters "S. A. M." (Space Available Mail) on the address side below the postage and above the name of the addressee. These parcels, if mailed by December 1st, will be delivered by Christmas.

Parcels mailed between December 1st and December 11th should be sent "Air Mail" for Christmas delivery.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper with material adds strength to the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of article within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing list of contents and the name and address of sender and addressee should be enclosed in the parcel. Customs Declarations, completed by the senders, are required on parcels to many destinations.
