

NAACP Field Dir. Enters Race For Congressman In Miss.

Charles Evers Lower House JACKSON. Miss.-The

Evers for Congress campaign was kicked off at a rally held here Friday night, Feb. 2. Presince 1963, had requested, and had been granted, a leave of absence to enter the race for the vacancy created by the election of the incumbent

John Bell Williams as governor of the state. In response to Mr. Evers' request, Mr. Wilkins granted "leave without salary until conclusion of the campaign" and wished him "good luck in this effort in behalf of the citizens of Mississippi." Following receipt of this telegram, Mr. Evers announced his candidacy here on Jan. 25.

The NAACP field director was the unanimous choice of Negro leaders in the state's Third Congressional District. He will be opposed in the race by five white candidates. The special election is scheduled for Feb. 27. If no candidates receives a majority of the

votes there will be a run-off election between the top two candidates two weeks later. The Negro vote in the 12county district is estimated at 76.000 and the white at 125, 000. "I know all the Negroes

25 Negro Educators Denounce viousiy, Charles Evers, NAACP field director for Mississippi since 1963, had requested and **Racist Talk' of White Speakers**

Dr. William H. Brown Succumbs At Lincoln Hospital Tuesday

Dr. William H. Brown, 58, professor of education at North Carolina College and a member of the interim committee which administered the college from February, 1966, until July, 1967, died Tuesday afternoon in Lincoln Hospital.

Funeral services will be held Friday, February 9, at 3:00 pm in B. N. Duke Auditorium. All faculty members of NCC will serve as honorary pallbearers. Father E. N. Porter, vicar of St. Titus Church will officiate.

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Dr. Brown was among the nation's most eminent educators. His research findings were reported in some 50 articles in leading professional journals.

He joined the North Carolina College faculty in 1949 as director of the Bureau of Edu-



cational Research. He remained involved in educational research through his terms of service as dean of the graduate school, from 1958 to 1964, and as a member of the interim committee, from 1966 (See DR. BROWN page 8A)

NEW YORK-The time for black and white educators to talk together about the problems of big-city schools is over. Perhaps what was the final curtain crashed down on the dialogue last month at a conference of 70 leading educators at Harvard University. when some 25 Negro participants denounced the "racist talk" of white speakers and exited to their own private caucus during the rest of the conference.


The Negro educators drew up a document declaring that white society "is bent on genocide of all black people." The caucus also said it was determined to "battle with whatever weapons. . . to wrest control . . . from the hands of those in power." The dissident black educators outlined the framework for a national organization to gain absolute community control of black schools, and they rejected educational subsystems as being "irrelevant."

UNCF Receives **Record Sum** During 1967

> NEW YORK, N. Y.-The United Negro College Fund today announced that it received the record sum of \$4,629,781 during 1967.

REV. DAYE

Dr. Stephen J. Wright, president of the Fund, reported that total income obtained during the campaign year represented a gain of more than \$600.000 over 1966 - - and the largest annual increase in the Fund's 24-year history. The increase in campaign income will go largely to help meet skyrocketing educational costs, and to help educate the larger number of Negro youth enrolled this year in the Fund's member colleges.

One of the most significant aspects of the campaign, Dr. Wright observed, was the fact the Fund's appeal that achieved record level in several large communities where riots occured during 1967.
