Dr. M. L. Wilson Re-elected Pres. of Lott Carey Convention

BALTIMORE, MARYLAND— Dr. M. L. Wilson, pastor of Convent Avenue Baptist Church in New York City, was re-elected president of Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention at the 71st Annual Session meeting here at Wayland Baptist Church August 26-30.

Mayor Walter E. Washington of Washington, D. C. who received his early training in the convention told the assembled delegates, "In the city the church cannot walk away from the growing frustrating problems of the city and expect to live in peace and tranquility. If we believe in God, then we must also believe that they have the very dignity of the Divine because God created them in His own image.

If we hear the word of God we must listen to the poor. The church can do much to create an environment which will make the cities a benefit, not a hindrance.

Washington told the delegates that we are not only in trouble as a nation, we are in trouble as a species. Man is in America have come face to face with tragedy. We are saddened and confused, however, the time has come with clear force that requires us to tell the nation that Robert F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Medgar Evers and John F. Kennedy, and other leaders, have not died in vain that a bullet does not kill a cause—that the goals and dreams of these men can still come true.

The only fitting memorial to these valiant men is the living reality of bricks and mortar in homes for the ill-housed, better schools for the poorly educated, and the proper distribution of our resources so that all our people can live decent productive lives.

Mayor Washington said that Urban problems "must become the problems of religion." In the city the church cannot walk away from the growing frustrating problems and expect to live in peace and tranquility.

BLACK CHURCH

The spirit of the Lott Carey and early pioneers who bought their freedom from slavery by picking scraps of tobacco at Chase City, Virginia must not be forgotten. Our work in Liberia stands out and must continue to expand its budget as was reported by our executive secretary.

Dr. Wendell C. So nmerville, executive secretary of the organization reported more than 251 thousand dollars raised for foreign missions during the year.
