Sgt. Hargrove Retires After 21 Years in Army

S/Sgt. John H. Hargrove, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Hargrove of Oxford, has completed twenty-one years of continuous military service.

On December 29, 1947 he enlisted in the regular army at Fort Bragg. His basic training was completed at Fort, New Jersey, after which he was shipped to Japan for occupational duties and further training in combat tactics. In Japan, he was assigned to the 24th Infantry Regiment of the 25th Infantry Tropical Lightening Division.

In June, 1950, he was transferred to Korea twenty-one days after the outbreak of hostilities. He served in combat for one year. During this time he was wounded twice—then later requiring extensive hospital care. His last 12 months were spent in the Viet Crisis. He is the recipient of the following medals for services rendered in Korea: Combat Infantry Badge, The Presidential Unit Citation (U. S. A.), The Purple Heart (2 awards), The Korean Presidential Unit Citation, United Nations Service Medal W/2 Clusters and Korean Conflict Service Medal. Other medals received: Good Conduct Medal W/6 Awards, American Service Ribbon and Medal, American Defense Ribbon and Medal, World War II Occupational Medal and The Accommodation Medal. His tour of duty has carried him to many places, Germany, Japan and Europe.

Typhoon Hits

TAIPEI, Formosa—Typhoon Elaine swept through Formosa leaving 29 dead, 20 missing and 23 injured, the Chinese Nationalist police announced Tuesday. Police said 338 houses had collapsed and 171 were badly damaged. Thousands of persons were rendered temporarily homeless after being forced to evacuate low-lying areas when the floodwaters invaded their homes. Many bridges were washed out by flood waters. Thousands of persons were stranded because of disrupted highway and rail traffic.

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

PARDON vs. JUSTIFICATION
A man named Zimmerman, recently spent nearly twenty-five years in prison for a murder which, it is now clear, he never committed. The mistake was discovered and he was released, of course; but only after spending almost a quarter century in prison as an innocent man!

This was a grim mistake, but even at that, it must be wonderful in such a case to be free—and to have people actually sympathize with you! Yet, after years of liberty, Zimmerman says he still feels a bit numb. Waking up mornings he still imagines he hears the harsh sound of the prison bell, and looking about he still thinks he sees bars on the windows. Things could be worse though: Suppose he were guilty of the crime, merely pardoned and released. Then every one would be saying: "There goes that murderer. They pardoned him. Don't get too friendly with him." The stigma would always remain—as long as he lived. Let us thank God that believers in Christ are not merely pardoned. Rom. 3:24 declares that we are "justified freely by God's grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus."

Christ died for our sins and satisfied the just claims of the law, and more: through the Holy Spirit He revolutionizes our lives and makes new creations out of us. "If any man be in Christ," says II Cor. 5:17, "he is a new creation." "For by grace are ye saved, through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God: not of works lest any man should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath ordained that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:8-10).

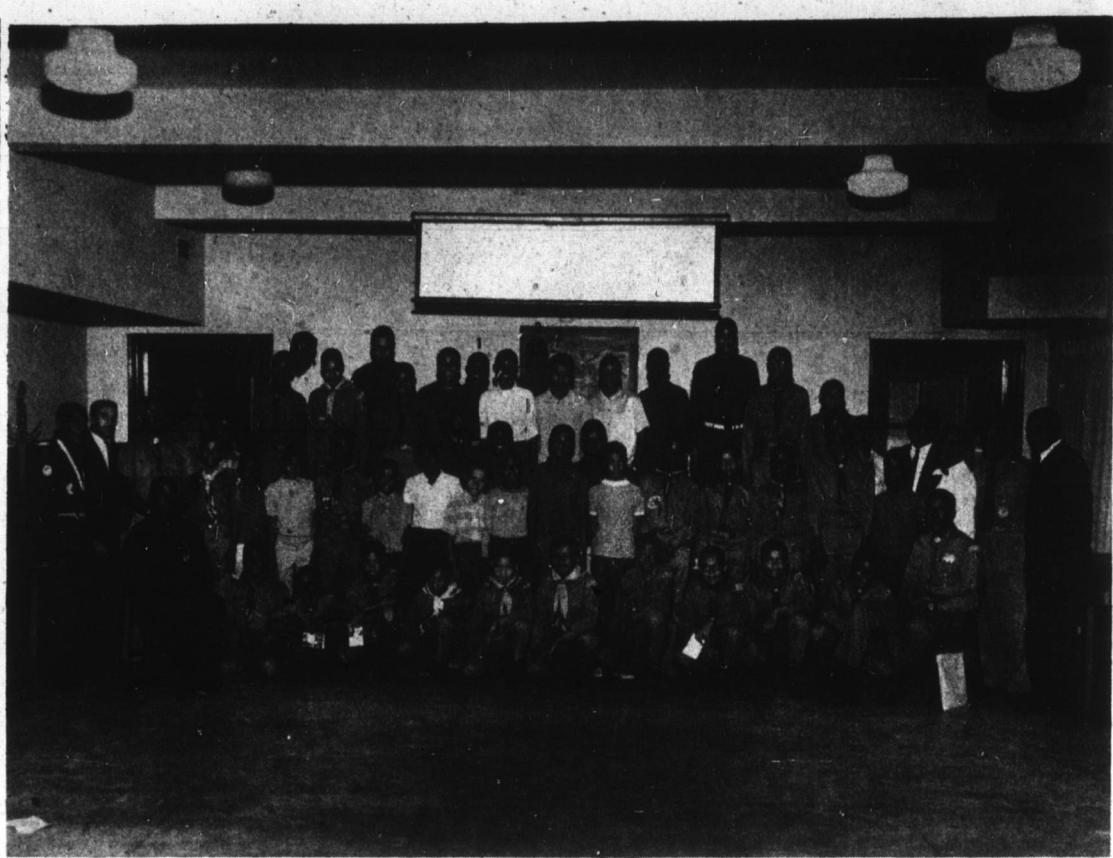

The National Bible Institute of New York City conferred the Honorary Degree of Doctor of divinity on Rev. Melvin F. Ward recently. The Rev. M. F. Ward completed his elementary education at the James City Training School, James City, and attended the Hillside High

School, Durham, but graduated from West Street High School, New Bern, in 1933. He was inducted into the Army in 1941. After service in the U. S. Army, he attended the National Bible Institute in New York City, Lawson's Bible Institute in New York City, and Hood Theological Sem-

inary, Salisbury. The Rev. M. F. Ward was licensed in the New York Conference in 1944. He was admitted to the Central North Carolina Conference of the A.M.E. Zion Church in 1946. Churches pastored in the last 22 years by the Rev. Ward are: O'Bryant's Chapel, Chapel Hill, Russell Chapel, Pittsboro, Chestnut Circuit, Cummock, Kesler's Temple, Henderson, Cameron Grove, Broadway, and for the past six years at Trinity A.M.E. Zion Church, Dunn.

During his years of pastoring he has renovated five churches, built one, purchased several pieces of church properties, paid off a 10-year mortgage on church properties in Dunn in 2 1/2 years, and purchases some materials for the building of a new church in Dunn.
