### **National Employ** The Handicapped Week Set Oct. 6-12

More than 13,000 handicapped persons employed on a full-time basis by the Veterans Administration will lead VA's observance of National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, Oct. 6-12, Administrator of Veterans Affairs William J. Driver said today.

These employees constitute about 8.4 per cent of the VA's full-time work force.

Sharing their special interest in NEPH week, sponsored by the President's Committee on Employment of the handicapped, will be nearly 500 mentally retarded persons employed by the VA, Driver said.

He noted that since the Federal program of hiring the mentally retarded began, the VA has made almost one-tenth of all appointments by the 40 agencies participating in the program.
