Most recently, our Department has moved into the area of attempting to secure the release of black political prisoners such as Martin Sostre. It is our belief that the basic reason underlying the dismissal of Mr. Steel is the effort of the Board of the NAACP to check the moves of the Legal Department in such controversial matters.

Pursuant to our letter of October 24, 1968, addressed to the Board of Directors of the NAACP, copy of which you have received, we hereby tender our resignations as members of the legal staff. The resignations will be effective no later than November 29, 1968.
