New Booklet of Interest to Person Under Security Issued

A booklet that should be of interest to every person covered under social security has just been issued by the Social Security Administration.

"If You Become Disabled," points out in clear and concise terms the latest changes in the disability program, as well as the basic provisions of the law. It helps to clear up a number of misconceptions about how the disabled qualify for social security payments.

Even people who are aware that social security is not just a retirement program—that the survivors and disability part of the program protects young workers and their families—may not be too familiar with the disability program. And some people may not have

heard about recent changes in the law, which make it easier for people to get disability benefits. These changes are carefully explained in the new booklet.

The booklet points out, for example, that young workers who may not have had the opportunity to build up social security credit for five years of work may now be eligible for disability benefits. Now, a worker who becomes disabled before age 24 needs to have worked under social security only 1½ years in the 3-year period before his disability began. A worker who becomes disabled before he is 31, needs credit for having worked half the time between 21 and the
