

Parents Would Get Some Help

WASHINGTON

Asst. HEW Secretary James Farmer wants to extend the Head Start program into the home — to work with children 3 years and younger and their parents.

"Some say that is too early to learn," Farmer, highest ranking Negro in the Nixon

administration, said in an interview. "I don't think so."

HEAD START was begun during the Johnson administration as part of the war on poverty. It is an attempt to give preschool children from poor families some basic skills and health care so they will have a "head start" when they begin school.

The program traditionally has been carried out in classroom-type settings for 4 and 5-year-old children.

HE SAID THE parents of the poor need to be taught how to teach their children better.

"The Westinghouse report indicated a greater need for developing learning skills in children," he said.

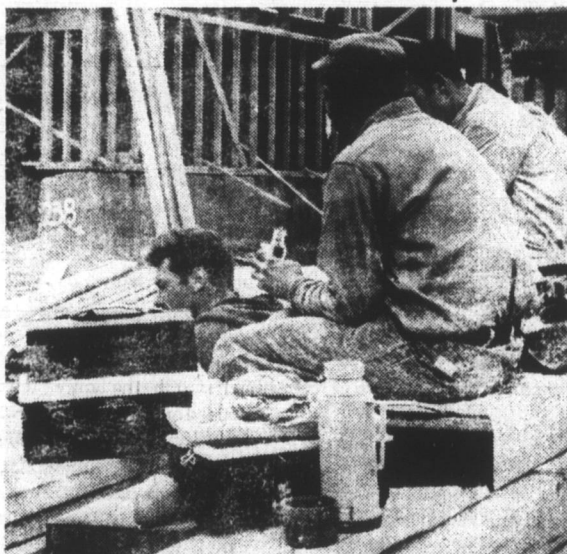

"Many Head Start programs have not emphasized learning skills," Farmer said. "They have emphasized social skills."
