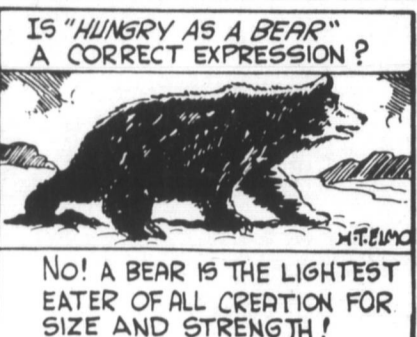
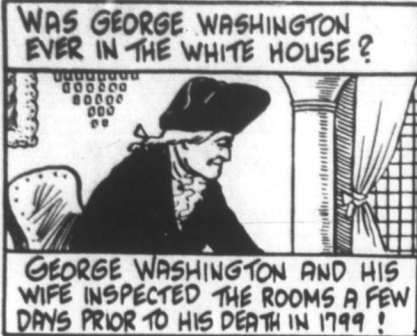

Battleship to Get Rare WWII Plane

WILMINGTON — The battered remnants of a Navy Kingfisher airplane left Wilmington Saturday night for Dallas, Tex., where it will be rebuilt to grace the battleship U.S.S. North Carolina.

Bob High, a spokesman for the battleship commission, said the pontoon plane is the only known Kingfisher which isn't in a museum or on display somewhere. Similar planes flew from the ship to scout during her active career.

The restored battleship has been looking for a Kingfisher for years. From 1961, when the "Showboat" North Carolina arrived at Wilmington, until 1965, it had no success.

Then the Air Museum of Canada said a wrecked Kingfisher had been found near Vancouver, where it had lain undiscovered since it crashed in World War II.

The Kingfisher's engine, instrument panel and floats

were missing, but the pieces were crated and shipped to Wilmington, where battleship officials decided to try to have it restored.

Last fall, an engineer from the Dallas firm of Vought Aeronautics came to Wilmington to inspect the parts and reported back to the parent company, Ling-Temco-Vought. The predecessor firm of L-T-V, Chance Vought, built Kingfishers during the war.

Last week the firm said members of its Quarter-Century Club would rebuild the airplane. The club's members include many persons who built the originals.

High said that for the retirees, it's a "labor of love." The rebuilt aircraft is expected back in Wilmington in about a year, High said.

The plane will have a 450-horsepower Pratt & Whitney engine which had been on display at the battleship for years, just as the original did.

Building Is Bombed In Saigon

SAIGON — An explosion that rocked downtown Saigon Sunday night wrecked South Vietnam's government national press center and spread panic among hundreds in the street celebrating the lunar new year. No casualties were reported.

It was the second apparent terrorist bombing in the capital's downtown area in 10 days, but the first since the Tet holiday began last Friday.

The U. S. Command said the explosion was caused by about 20 pounds of shaped plastic charge placed on the second floor of the yellow concrete building.

Several hours earlier a terrorist shot and wounded a courier for the U. S. Command as he drove on a downtown street. The terrorist escaped.
