

The Legal Defense Fund's handling of the contempt charges against Bobby Seale and the amicus briefs filed by the Fund in behalf of the Panthers 21 has the potential of raising questions concerning the credibility of the Commission's findings so long as I remain as Director. I have been a staff attorney for LDF for nearly ten years and I would not want this fact to jeopardize the work of the Commission.

I, therefore, feel obliged to tender my resignation as Staff
