

Student NEA Pres. Criticizes **Elections** Laws

Percy A. Peele, II, president of the North Carolina Student NEA/NCAE Monday criticized the N.C. State Board of Elections for ignoring provisions of the recently passed Voting Rights Act.

The federal law, which goes into effect Jan. 1, 1971 extends voting to 18 years old and abolishes literary tests as requirement for voter registration.

The lowering of the voting age to 18 years was one of the national priorities set by the Student NEA the past year. And its passage by Congress and the signing by President Nixon on June 22 marked a hopeful victory.


