

Helicopters to Participate In **Project Mast**

WASHINGTON - United States Air Force helicopters of the Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Service will begin participation in the Military Assistance for Safety in Traffic (MAST) project, Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird announced today.

Helicopter detachments of the 42nd Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron, Military Airlift Command, at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho, and at Luke Air Force Base, Arizona, will begin flying MAST missions today. Detachment 15 at Luke and detachment 22 at Mountain Home are both equipped with the HH-43B dual-rotor tensive rescue duty in South-

The project, announced jointly by Secretary Laird and Department of Transportation (DOT) Secretary John A. Volpe on July 15, is designed to determine the value of helicopters in providing medical sistance to automobile accident victims and other persons needing emergency medical care. The initial MAST test was begun in mid-July in the San Antonio, Texas area by the United States Army's 507th Air Ambulance Company from Fort Sam Houston. The DOT is the lead agency in the MAST Study Group which had Department of Defense and Health, Education, and Welfare representation. Secretary Laird has designated the Army as Department of Defense Executive Agent for the
