Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe announced

- The Department is offering aviation war risk insurance coverage to American air carriers because the insurance is not available at reasonable rates from commercial in-

Volpe To Confer With Europeans On Recent Aircraft Hijacking

WASHINGTON, D. C. -President Nixon today announced he is sending Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe as his personal emissary to six European cities to confer with top European civil aviation and airport officials about the international aspects of air piracy. Among these of aircraft hijacking.

Secretary Volpe will meet with officials in Amsterdam, and personal and baggage Frankfurt, Paris, London and Zurich to discuss measures to prevent air piracy.

Announcement of the visit follows Secretary Volpe's presentation Friday to the governing council of the International Civil Aviation Organization of the United States position on aircraft hijacking.

The Secretary asked the international aviation community to support the principle of suspension of air services to nations that harbor persons responsible for air piracy or those that detain passengers and crew or any aircraft that has been illegally seized.

Secretary Volpe, in his

meetings with the European officials, is expected to discuss the United States position on hijacking. He also is expected to attempt to set up a formal means of exchanging information on measures that can be taken to counter acts measures are electronic surveillance, the use of armed guards, searches for boarding passen

The Secretary is tentatively scheduled to be in Rome on September 28, in Zurich and Frankfurt on September 29, in Paris and Amsterdam on September 30, and in London on October 1.
