# Bias Charges Brought By Black Police FÉDÉRAL AGENCIES FIND THAT 22,4100 WORKERS ON GOV'T JOBS UNDERPAID

**Findings** Are **Contained** In Wage Report

WASHINGTON - Approximately 22,400 employees were found due \$2.8 million in wage underpayments on Government contract work during Fiscal Year 1970, investigations made by the Federal Wage and Hour Division and other Government enforcement agencies have disclosed.

The findings are contained in a wage and Hour report on Government enforcement activity under the Davis-Bacon and Related Acts and the Contract Work Hours Safety Standards Act, which deal primarily with wages and hours on construction contracts.

In issuing the report, Wage and Hour Administrator Robert D. Moran pointed out that while the Division's 960 Compliance Officers conducted 55% of all Government investigations under these laws, they accounted for \$2 million or 71% of the total back wages found due nearly 14.000 or 62% of the total number of laborers and mechanics found underpaid.
