
Mrs. Collins is currently vice-president of the Republic of New Africa and was until recently a member of the national board of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. She is national coordinator

of the International Committee for Black Resisters. This group works to free black men convicted for refusing to be drafted or who are in prison for other political reasons. It also seeks to make their cases known throughout the world and to provide them with legal help.

Mrs. Collins is the mother of ten children, the voungest in their teens. Her father and her grandfather were active in the struggles for freedom and civil rights for black people in Louisiana.

C. T.: Mrs. Collins, you are in the triangle area visiting the universities to circulate a petition for your son. What do you hope to accomplish through this?

Mrs. C.: Walter received five, five-year prison sentences for



he was not allowed time to even pick up a toothbrush. Normally, the defendent, in a case such as this, is notified in time to take care of personal matters, and allowed to turn himself in.

There have been many breaches of justice in this case and all appeals have been turned down. Our last chance is through this petition. We are filing it not only in the United States. but in Europe and Asia to bring the case to the courts of International Law. We sincerely thing we can get Walter freed with the petition. 




