"We also consider it an effort to do away with the position of Director of Tenant Services and Community Services. This position's primary responsibility is to improve the benefits of public housing," Wheeler said.

He further stated that this seemed to be the history of the attitude of Durham's Housing Authority. "These people do not live in public housing because they wish to. Public Housing is intended to provide its tenants with the same dignity as anyose else. The firing of Tillman represents an affront to the black community. It is asking the Durham community to ignore the trend of thinking of the housing authority and its obvious attitude, not in keeping with the Commission of U.S. Department of Urban Development."

According to Wheeler, Tillman was the bright spot in the community. The people offering the protest called for a revisal of the policies of the housing authority and new guidelines by HUD. The commissions represented at Wednesday' conference said they were in the initial stages of protest and further actions were not planned at that time.




