Correction Commission 'Going For Broke'

Increase in prison unrest in the nation is prompting the N.C. Commission of Correction to support a budget for the next biennium to meet actual needs rather than supply only what the prison system "can get by on," a Greensboro commission member said today.

A. S. Webb, savings and loan executive, made the statement in explaining his successful push earlier this week at a commission meeting in Raleigh for a \$40 million budget, the estimate for actual needs, rather than an initially proposed budget of \$24 million, covering minimum requirements and "in some areas much less than minimums."

"The Governor, the legislature and the citizens of North Carolina must be made to understand that the rehabilitation of inmates would be accidental, based upon the inadequate building facilities, untrained personnel, inadequate staff and limited programs maintained and operated by the Department of Correction," Webb said.

"I made it quite clear to the commission and a commissioner (V. Lee Bounds) that my personal observation over the past several months of the four prison institutions I visited would not allow me to think in terms of minimum budget requests for the department," he continued.

"I pointed out also that I am becoming more and more embarrassed as I examine these institutions and see the plight of black and other economically-deprived folks," he said.

He charged a "lack in the equal administration of justice under the law, a false sense of responsibility to the system and racism among police, solicitors, judges, prison officials and society as a whole" are reflected in statistics he obtained on inmate counts at the end of the year:

- Of 9,235 males, 5,063 or 54.7 per cent were black.
- Of 360 females, 227 or 63 per cent were black.

"My charge is supported" in the fact that minorities make up only 23.2 per cent of the state's population, according to the 1970 census," he said.

Webb said, as a part of his

efforts on behalf of a \$40 million budget request, he stressed to Bounds the necessity for employment of blacks at the policy-making and top administrative levels in the correction department.

"The top administrative levels of employment would include noted black criminologist, psychiatrist, psychologist and medical doctors," he said.

Presently, he said, assignment at the policy-making and top administrative levels in the department is: One black on the seven-member commission; white commissioner, two white deputy commissioners and two white administrative assistants; six white area administrators; one black regional commander of 19; and one black superintendent of 73.

"The figures exclude the Cen-

tral Prison and North Carolina Correctional Center for Women," he said.

"Prisons are public institutions which, citizens of North Carolina must be made aware, are looked upon by many inmates as places of despair and the 'end of the road,' Webb asserted.

"After all, it is our tax dollars that make our entire penal system operate," he said. "Simply as taxpayers, we should have a run and whether or not the state is releasing back into our communities hardened criminals or rehabilitated persons."

He said "accusing and pointing of fingers" will not meet the needs and solve the problems of the department of corrections.

"Adequate appropriations with a commitment to the fair treatment of all people will help in placing North Carolina in the vanguard of prison reform," he said.
