

## Classes Are Offered At Planetarium

From novice to professional, the Morehead Planetarium's 1972 schedule of special courses offers something for lay persons at all interest levels.

Following the ongoing course, "Special Topics in Astronomy" a "Navigation in Coastal Waters" course will be offered three times this year starting in March, July and September. The class will meet for eight sessions, and tuition is \$20.00.

The summer courses at the

Planetarium consist of two elementary units in descriptive astronomy for youngsters 8 through 11. The first is entitled "The Solar System," followed by "The Distant Stars." Tuition for each elementary course is \$10.00. The annual two-day Astronomy Institute for junior and senior high school boys and girls is slated July 10-11. Tuition is \$17.50 plus \$3.50 for overnight housing is supervised UNC dormitories. Rounding out activities for young people is a 10-session Science Fun course for 8 to 11 year olds. A \$10.00 fee covers tuition for the class which will meet Monday through Friday from 9:30-10:30 a.m. July 17-28.

The Planetarium will again offer a five day Astronomy and Space Science Institute for

teachers between July 24 and 28. The course, taught by Planetarium staff and educational specialists from NASA, carries one renewal credit with tuition underwritten, for a maximum of fifty public school teachers, by the State Department of Public Instruction.

Astronomy for the family will be emphasized in Fall courses which include "Constellations and Legends," "Astronomy for Young People," and "Introduction to Astronomy."

## 1,900 Placed On Books in Weekend Drive

A city-wide voter registration drive last Friday and Saturday brought in 1,900 applications for registration. This was the largest two-day registration drive ever held in Durham County. It means that over 3,100 people have registered to vote at the two "registration weekends" conducted by the Durham Committee on Voter Registration.

We were very pleased with the community's response to the two registration weekends. I want to again point out that the overwhelming response to our plan - that of placing registrars at several central locations in the community where a great many people shop or do business, and of conducting registration at night and on the weekend - suggests that similar features should be incorporated into the official voter registration efforts of the Board of Elections.

A third registration drive will be conducted by the Durham Committee on Voter Registration. It was in the five city and county high schools on Wednesday, March 15. It should be made clear that this registration drive was for high school students only, of whom there are some 2000 eligible voters.

The County Board of elections will continue to hold registration on weekdays, from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. The Board will also have registrars available in the precinct polling places on the next three Saturdays, March 18, 25, and April 1, from 9:00 a.m. until 6:30

p.m. Anyone wishing to know where his precinct polling place is should call the Durham County Board of Elections. The deadline of registration for the May 6 Primary elections is April 7.

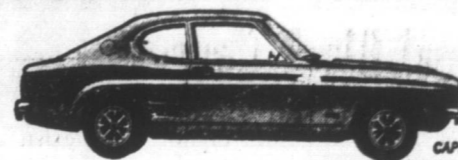

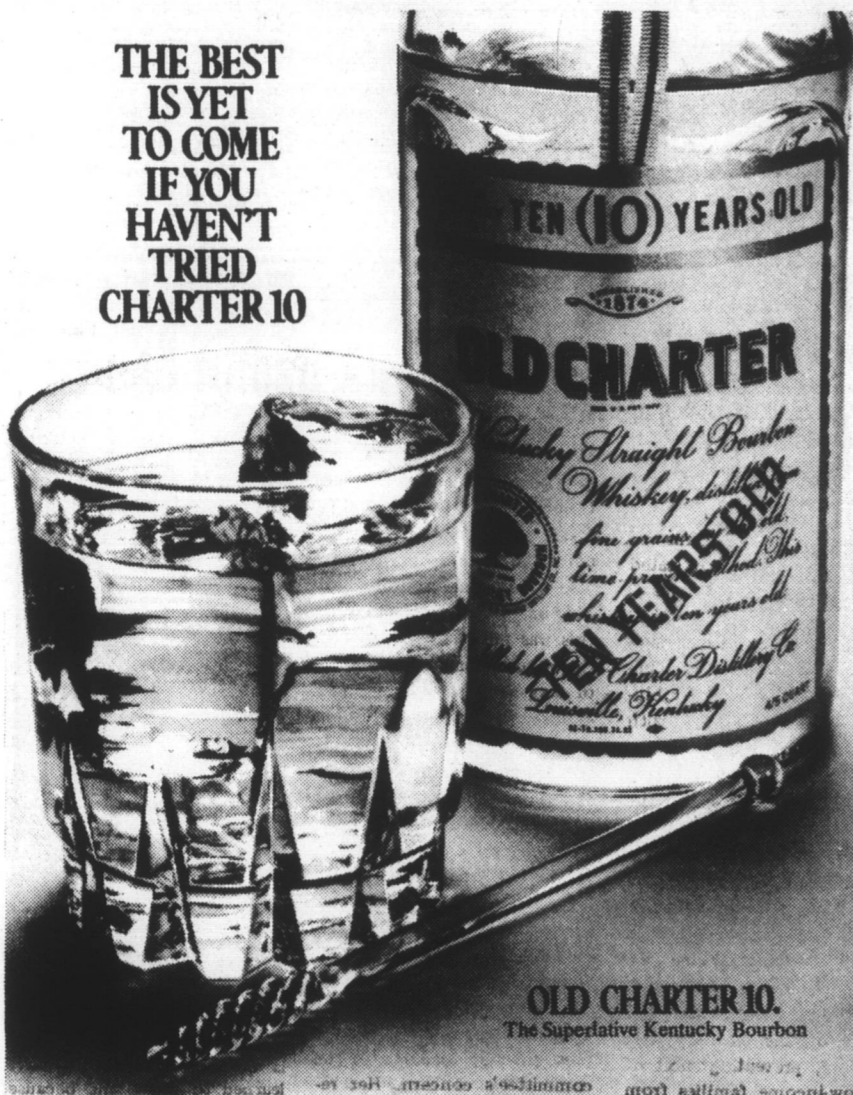
