We were very pleased with the community's response to the two registration weekends. I want to again point out that the overwhelming response to our plan - that of placing registrars at several central locations in the community where a great many people shop or do business, and of conducting registration at night and on the weekend - suggests that similar features should be incorporated into the official voter registration efforts of the Board of Elections.

A third registration drive will be conducted by the Durham Committee on Voter Registration. It was in the five city and county high schools on Wednesday, Marcy 15. It should be made clear that this registration drive was for high school students only, of whom there are some 2000 eligible

The County Board of elections will continue to hold registration on weekdays, from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. The Board will also have registrars available in the precinct polling places on the next three Saturdays, March 18, 25, and April 1, from 9:00 a.m. until 6:30 p.m. Anyone wishing to know where his precinct polling place is should call the Durham County Board of Elections. The deadline of registration for the May 6 Primary elections is April 7.






