> The largest advance in ranking, among NIA companies, was achieved by Afro-American Life, which moved upward 199 places, from 795 to 596. Formerly ranked 10th among NIA companies, with \$61 million in force, it now ranks 7th with \$174 million in force.

Supreme Life Insurance Company of America showed the second largest leap moving 171 places to 346 from 517 and registered the second highest in-force increase, \$355. million, for a total of \$566.8 million. Atlanta Life Insurance Company, down one notch to fourth place among NIA companies, slipped 25 places on the ranking table, although insurance in force increased \$9 million over last year's \$308

Disclosure of Loans Met with Loud Protest

In the face of worldwide opposition to apartheid-and yet out of sight-a consortium of U. S., Canadian, and European banks have made \$215 million (dollars) of loans to the white minority regime of South Africa.

The operation came to light in recent weeks when confidential bank documents were leaked to a source in the ederal republic of Germany (West Germany).

The secrecy surrounding the loans, however, has in some ways continued. There have been reports about suppression of these disclosures in the press due to pressure from American banks. An expose written for Times last week, for instance, was suddenly pulled from that newspaper at the last minute. The Times had been willing-last summer-to risk publication of the pentagon papers. But at least one bank implicated in last week's expose possessed sufficient financial leverage at the times

to kill the story.
Over 40 banks in North America and Europe have been channeling the loans to South Africa through the Nassau, Bahamas Branch of the (See LOANS, page 7A)


