A Campus Revival sponsored by the Pentecostal Fellowship of North Carolina Central University will begin Sunday, January 27, at 11:00 a.m. in B.N. Duke Auditorium.

The revival will last from January 27-February 2. The theme is "Power to Spare-No Energy Crisis in Jesus." Services will begin each night at 7 p.m. in the Alfonso Elder Student Union.

Evangelist Mary Tilghman will conduct a workshop of Bible discussions and choir rehearsals each afternoon at 5 p.m. in room 108 of the Find Arts Building.

The public is invited to attend the revival services and participate in the workshops.

**RECREATION PROGRAMS EASE PAINS OF WINTER**

Boredom and mischief for the winter is no longer a problem for some children and adults here in Durham.

Recreation programs, including Karate, cheerleading, creative dancing, and arts and crafts, are being provided for ten weeks at the Walltown, T.A. Grady, and Lyon Park recreation centers.

A free course in income tax filing is even being offered to adults from five to six o'clock on Tuesday nights.

"The main purpose for these recreational activities," says director Carl Washington of Durham, "is to expose adults and children to programs not only for fun and leisure but for experience, knowledge, sportsmanship, and brotherhood."

The karate class is for beginners, pre-teens, teenagers, and adults, ranging in age from 13 to 58. Creative dancing is for children under 13. Fundamentals of cheerleading is for girls aged 12 to 16. Washington says attendance and response have been very good so far.

**NEED VOLUNTEERS SAYS PRISON CHIEF**

Mrs. Juanita Baker, Black Superintendent of the North Carolina Correctional Center for Women, spoke to the Criminal Justice Club of North Carolina Central University Monday, January 21.

Mrs. Baker made a plea for more student involvement in the volunteer programs at the correctional center in Raleigh.

Mrs. Baker stated that there is currently a community volunteer program in which women and married couples may sponsor an inmate on week-ends and holidays.

The in-unit volunteer program allows men and women to work within the unit and conduct various classes.

Dedicated volunteers are needed to help the four hundred women in the institution, she said.

According to Mrs. Baker the ages of the inmates range from sixteen to over seventy years. Volunteers, who are screened for eligibility, are selected and matched according to ages and interests.

**HILLSIDE BAND INVITED TO MARDI GRAS FETE**

The Hillside High School marching band has been invited to participate in the 1974 New Orleans Mardi

Gras. They will appear in the Mardi Gras from February 21 through the 24th, if they can raise another \$6,000.

The 114-member band, led by drum major Jeffery Lawrence and head majorette Pam Stanback, is directed by Mr. Clark Edgerton Jr. Mr. Edgerton has been the director of the band for the last 6 years and has taught band in the Durham City Schools for 9 years. This is the first time that Mr. Edgerton has taken a band to the Mardi Gras, and this is the first time in the history of Hillside that its band has participated in a festivity of this kind.

All of the students in the band and Mr. Edgerton have been working extremely hard to prepare themselves for the trip. In preparation for the trip they have been trying to raise \$9,000 to for accommodations. So far they have reached the goal of approximately \$3,000. They are asking all in the community to make contributions. "If the goal isn't reach, reported Mr. Edgerton," each member would have to pay \$90, which is impossible for some. As a result, the trip will not be made."

Some of the activities in which they have engaged to raise money are dances, talent shows, dinners, basketball games, and massive contributions from the community.

**MRS. BAKER SPEAKS OF CORRECTION JOBS**

Mrs. Juanita Baker, the first Black female to be superintendent of a correction center in North Carolina, spoke to the Criminal Justice Club at North Carolina Central University Monday, January 21. Presently she is administrator at North Carolina Correctional Center for women in Raleigh.

Mrs. Baker said the future for blacks in criminal justice is bright, but there are not enough blacks interested in the system, especially as administrators. She also said that there are a number of administrative positions with salaries ranging from \$10,000-\$15,000.

Program assistants such as teachers, psychologists, social workers, business administrators, and secretaries were also mentioned.

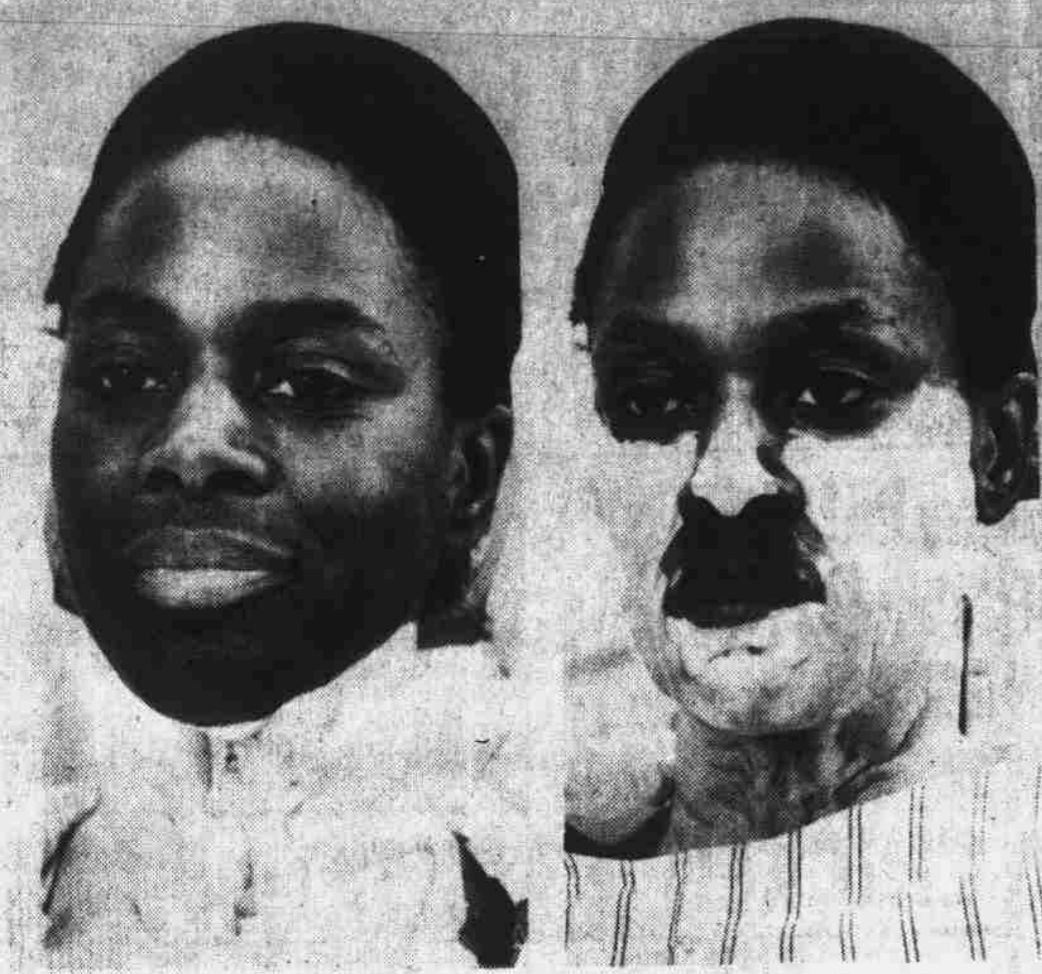
My mother and I are both cross-eyed. Will my children be? Is there any treatment for it?

In most cases, cross-eyes, or strabismus, is inherited. It is generally caused by excessive contraction of one of the muscles which moves the eyeball. When strabismus occurs in the first or second year of life, it is generally the result of abnormal functioning of the "fusion center" in the brain. There are actually two types of cross-eyes: convergent strabismus, where the eye turns in, usually associated with farsightedness; divergent strabismus, where the eye turns out, is associated with nearsightedness. Eyes that turn in are easier to treat. Fifty to 80 per cent of cross-eyes can be cured without surgery. Most essential in the treatment is wearing the proper glasses and following the eye exercise program prescribed by an ophthalmologist. It is important to start treatment early in a child's life, as soon as the condition is discovered. Chances for favorable results decrease considerably the longer it persists untreated. If after wearing eyeglasses, the strabismus has not improved, surgery is usually indicated. Overcoming cross-eyes by surgical procedure is certain.

I am 16 and have a common teen-age problem . . . acne. What causes it and is there anything I can do about it? Acne is seen so often among adolescents and young adults, it's almost "normal." At this stage of your development, your body is constantly changing.

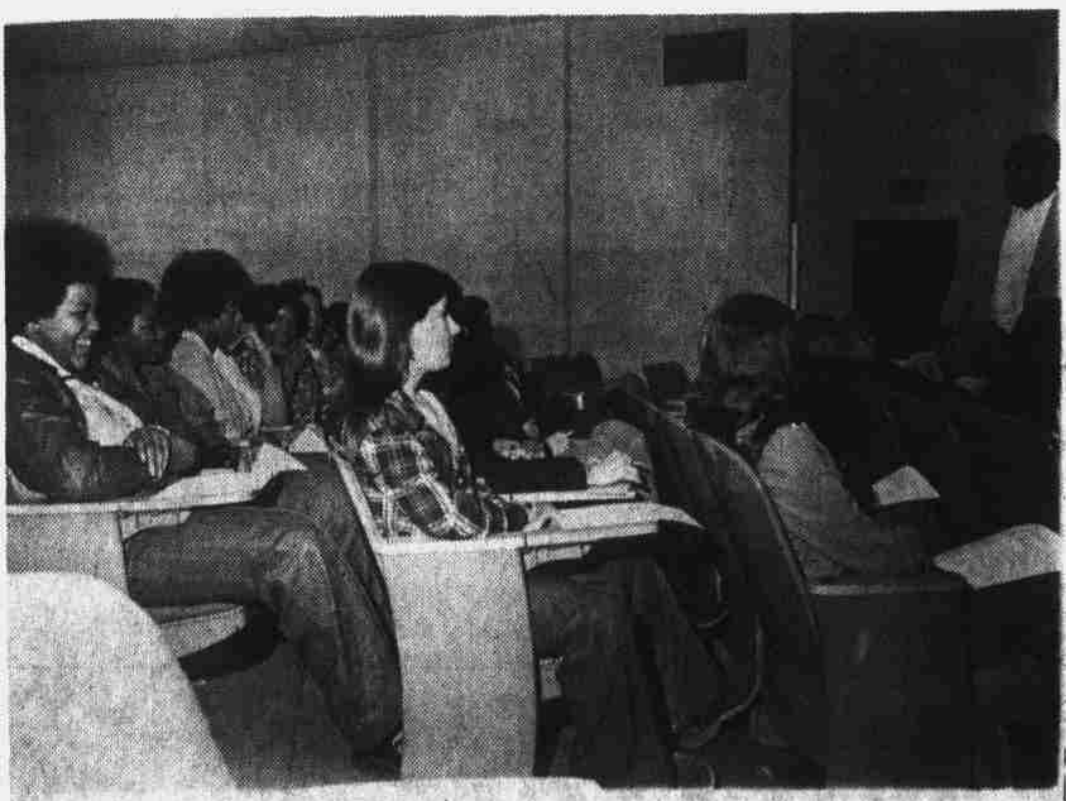

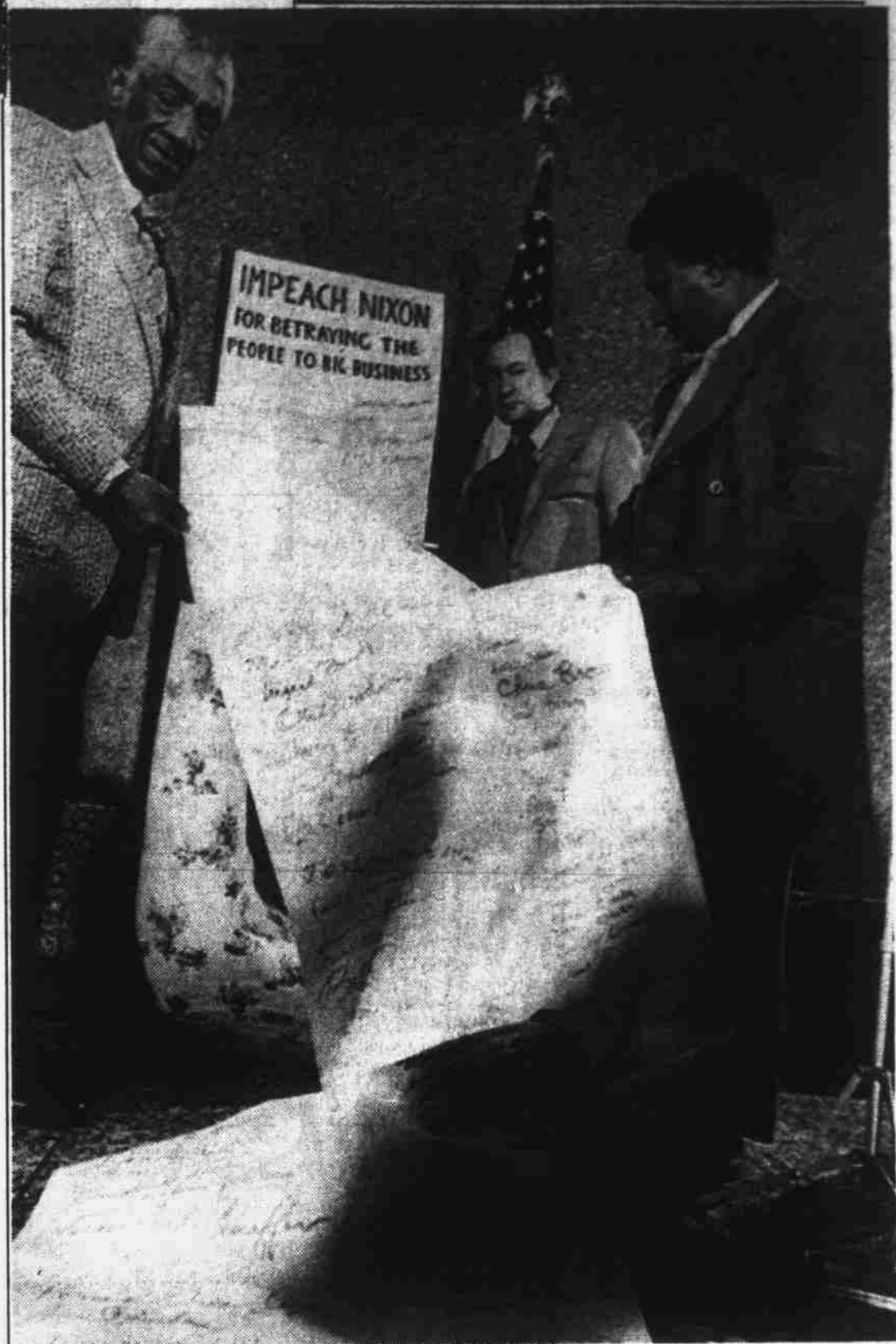
