Charles Hodson Files As Candidate For District Judge

Chapel Hill lawyer, Charles Hodson has filed as the Democratic candidate for District Court judge of Orange, Chatham and Alamance Counties. The announcement was made at a press conference in the Chapel Hill District Courtroom this past Monday.

Hodson, 50, is seeking the seat which is now held by Stanley Peele who also plans to run for re-election. He said that he would not criticize Peele, that he simply decided that this year would be a good time for his to run as he wanted to do so for several years.

Commenting on the death penalty, Hodson said, "If I had to vote, I would vote against the death penalty. There should be some other way we could protect society without the death penalty."

Hodson, who has been in a Chapel Hill resident since 1944, said that he was in favor of plea bargaining and that it should continued to be used.

"Without plea bargaining, we would never finish court dockets," said the lawyer of twenty-three years. He called for a halt to violent crimes, adding that full repayment should be re-

quired in such nonviolent crimes as larceny. Hodson also felt that there was much room for improvement in the district courts even though he acknowledged that there has been a great deal of improvement in recent years.

In addition to having served as state Jaycee Legal counsel and a member of the Jaycee executive committee, Hodson also served as vice chairman of the Orange County Democratic Executive Committee, president of the country Young Democratic Club and vice president of the Young Democrats Club of North Carolina.

Hodson is married to the former Virginia Grace Allen. They have two children.
