Financial Aid:

A Partial List of Resources for Women*

This information serves as a guide to selected financial aid information for women students. While some of the resources and programs described apply to undergraduate and graduate students of both sexes, many are geared toward the needs of older women, returning students, minority women, and those in professional and technical training programs. Presently over \$11 billion is available to students through financial aid programs administered by federal and state governments, schools, foundations, corporations, local businesses, trade and professional associations, and civic organizations. These sources provide scholarships, grants and loans. Many schools and colleges also offer work-study programs which provide financial aid in the form of wages for college-based work.

The publications and programs which follow are categorized by undergraduate and graduate-level aid, with special categories, such as athletic scholarships and occupational training grants, listed separately. A section on financial aid for minority women is included, followed by a discussion of state and federal student aid and a listing of selected government programs. Last, there is an additional list of selected publications describing financial aid programs. Most of the publications in this section are available in college and public libraries, and in high school and college financial aid, guidance and/or counseling offices.
