SERVE A CAKE WITH CLASS



With all the cake varieties in existence, why do we invariably name the same ones over and over again as our favorites? Chocolate, angel food, devil's food, sponge, pound, and carrot are almost always mentioned in the same breath. How pedestrian!!! How conventional!!!

Calavo Growers of California invites you to rid yourself of this hackneyed cake concept with "Paradise Mango Cake." Complete with an extra-moist texture, the crunch of walnuts, a spark of cinnamon, essence of orange, and last but certainly not least, juicy mango, this cake has all the credentials to be a contender.

According to the folks at Calavo, when choosing a mango for this recipe, do not judge ripeness by outside color. They say mangos are ready to eat when they yield to gentle pressure. (Depending on the variety

gos may be green, yellow, or tinged with red or yellow.) One characteristic is always constant: the mango's juicy interior is golden with a long flat seed in the center. The best way to prepare a mango for this sumptuous recipe is to first score its skin lengthwise. Then, simply peel the skin back as you would a banana. Next, cut away the mango flesh from the long seed with a sharp knife. That's all there is to it.

The mango's bright yellow flesh is loaded with more than the recommended daily allowance for vitamin A. Also, mangos contain nearly three-quarters of the RDA for vitamins C and amounts of thiamine, riboflavin, calcium, phosphorus and iron. Half a medium-sized mango has only about 66 calories.

Don't be a creature of habit when it comes to cake selection—serve a contender.

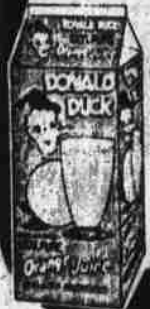
