There is no law providing for the ouster of immigrants seeking asylum or for the extradition of persons charged as criminals in Iran because "we do not have a treaty with Iran. . . . Only the president can make that decision. . . ." Rusk declar-ed, ". . . I don't know if this point has been overlooked or ignored. . . . " he continued.

Although he was critical of U.S. Senators, international visitors and even reporters for "interfering in U.S. foreign policy" during the crisis, Rusk said, "If I had a choice between a free press and free speech aimed at a specific target such as peace. . . and a free press and free speech without restrictions, I would prefer a free press. . . . without restrictions."

Rusk agreed that much of the Iranian crisis involved a propaganda battle by the Ayatollah Khomeini and
