

# 35 Minority Students Participate In SAAP at UNC-CH



Students Look On

Thirty-five minority health science students who are committed to pursuing a graduate or professional health program in the biomedical sciences, medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, optometry, podiatry, public health, and nurse midwifery are participating in an eight-week residential academic enrichment program, the 1980 Summer Academic Advancement Program (SAAP), at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The summer program is the fourth component of the year-round four-part enrichment/retention Health Careers Academic Advancement Program, sponsored by the N.C. Health Manpower Development Program and funded with a grant from the Health Careers Opportunity Program (HCOP), Office of Health Resources Opportunity (OHRO), Health

Resources Administration (HRA), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).

The SAAP, based at the School of Public Health and conducted from June 1 through July 30, consists of six major components: 192 contact hours in advanced academic classwork in biology, chemistry, mathematics, and physics (molecular biology, biochemistry, quantitative analysis in biomedical problems, biostatistics); advanced reading techniques to improve reading rate and comprehension; review and practice sessions to develop test sophistication and techniques for standardized professional school admissions examinations; clinical observations in health care agencies; health sciences and medical issues seminars; and an educational field trip to Washington, D.C., to visit

health agencies, professional health schools, and other governmental agencies which set policies and regulations governing health care delivery and services.

This broad range of enrichment experiences is designed to increase the number and strengthen the academic and basic skills preparedness of undergraduate, minority health science majors in order to enhance their competitiveness for admission to, retention in, and graduation from graduate and professional health programs.

The SAAP Scholars represent 26 colleges located in fourteen states. There are more students representing North Carolina

colleges and universities than any other state. There are 21 females and fourteen males, of whom eight have completed their baccalaure-

ate degree, nine are college seniors, and eighteen are juniors.

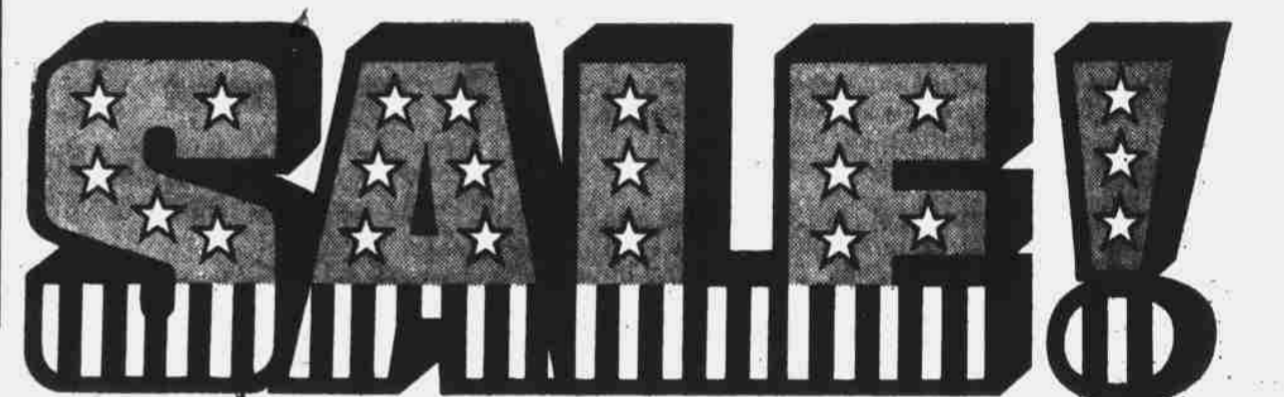


beginning July 1, 1980. She will be located at 415 Dunstan Street (Dr. R.E. King's office).
