Dr. Bueding's research was financed primarily with a \$650,000 AID grant, with supplemental funding from the National Institutes of Health. He noted that the AID grant expires next month and his continued research and testing would require additional funds.

'This is the way American science and a few American dollars can change the lives and productivity of hundreds of millions of people in

developing countries," said Douglass J. Bennet Jr. Administrator.

Dr. Bueding says his formulation is ready for clinical tests on humans and plans to ask the Food and Drug Administration for permission to conduct clinical trials on human volunteers.

"I am sure that there will be no problems with the effectiveness of the drug on humans," Dr. Bueding told AID officials, "but we want to be absolutely sure it is safe. That is why we will conduct human tests." AID would be able to provide the drug to people in developing countries once it is approved by the FDA. People afflicted with the disease tire easily and cannot work efficiently or at all. Snail fever therefore cripples the economy. In some areas, up to seventy per cent of the population suffer from the disease.

According to Dr. Alfred Buck, tropical disease advisor in AID's Office of Health, "the Chinese government has already experimented with the new formulation on 50,000 people quite successful-" He said two to three million Chinese suffer from schistosomiasis.

Dr. Buck said, "The drug appears to be effective against all three major forms of schistosomiasis. 

Parasitic and other tropical diseases ` notably malaria, snail fever and river blindness - are major causes of death and disability in developing countries.

AID's primary health care strategy to improve the well-being of poor people in developing coutnries consists of four key parts: broad, communityoriented networks to provide low-cost primary health care services, including maternal and child health, nutrition and family planning; better water -and sanitation; selected disease control; and health planning.


