President Carter on November 4.

Rev. Kelly Miller Smith, president of the National Conference of Black Churchmen, says the Churchmen join the Convention's Black Caucus in its support of President Carter.

These are the first in a number of black clergy endorsements resulting from the formation of the National Committee of Concerned Clergy for Carter (CCC), a national inter-denominational committee of clergy formed to urge a massive mobilization of their congregations on Election Day.

Rev. Maurice Dawkins, executive secretary of the CCC says, the clergy "will tell the story of President Carter's good works from the pulpits as well as of this Administration, its thirty billion dollar recovery plan, and its two billion dollar jobs plan for school dropouts and unemployed youth."

Bishop H.H. Brookins, chair of the CCC coordinating committee, says, "Now that voter registration is complete, we will activate a national network of committees and announcements in the pulpits across the country urging a 'Christian Walk' to the ballot box on November 4."

kind of concerned, sensitive and reasoned leader that can move this nation and our people out of these most perilous economic and social times. And I support your re-election one hundred per cent."

"I hope that our 240,000 subscribers, along with the more than 1.2 million readers, will follow our lead and cast their ballots on November 4 in favor of your re-election," Graves added.

The magazine's endorsement, titled "Again, Your Vote," was printed on the Publisher's Page and read as follows:

"The recent conservative drift of American politics has proven deeply harmful to the interests of black people. If we don't throw our vote in the balance against conservatism on

November 4 the damage will get worse. Each of us must go to the polls, and each of us must do everything possible to get relatives and friends and all other black people to go, too.

Once at the polls, of course, we confront choices that may not be easy or attractive. Here at Black Enterprise, we believe that in all races of major concern to blacks this year there is a clear-cut choice. It emerges when we ask ourselves two questions: What is in our interest as blacks? What is in the country's interest as we see it? It is on those criteria that we base our recommendations about who deserves the support of black voters on November 4.

First, we urge the re-election of Jimmy Carter.
