THOUGHT ABOUT A SUMMER JOB? If you're a college student, you may just be eligible for one of the state government internships which will be available in thirteen different state agencies during the summer.

Students will work for ten weeks, from June 8 to August 14, earning \$3.12 per hour. In addition to a 40-hour work week, they will attend seminars to learn more about state government and how it works. Most internships are in the Raleigh area, but some are available across the state.

To be eligible for an internship, a student must either be attending a North Carolina college, university, technical institute or community college, or be a North Carolina resident attending an equivalent out-of-state institution. College and university students must have completed their sophomore year while community and technical college students must have completed one year of study.

Each year SAF assists a limited number of professional touring theater, dance, opera and music groups with partial fee support to qualified sponsoring organizations in the Southeast. Performing groups are chosen based on their application, funds available and demand in a given art form.

A performing group must have a firm commitment from its board of directors, administrative staff and artists to the concept of touring for community audiences; a history of sound administrative and artistic direction and a regional or national reputation that demonstrates a high level of accomplishment. In addition, their artistic product, structured programs of educational value, and a demonstrated history of successful touring in their resident state will place the applicant in a favorable light.

SAF is a regional arts service organization with membership including the state arts agencies of Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North and South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia.
